

Robinson New B.E. Games 100-Yard Record-Holder

GARDIFF (CP) — Tommy Robinson, a dusky six-footer from the Bahamas who arrived in this city with a record for training in his capital too late for training in the new British Empire Games 100-yard record-holder.

The 20-year-old youth, enrolled at the University of Michigan on a scholarship, astounded track-and-field athletes with a 9.5-second sprint in a preliminary round of the 100.

His event was the first of 12 heats run off a day before the official opening of the Games because of a cluttered entry list.

His performance, which ticked 1.10 of a second off the Games record set by Australia's Johnny Treloar and Mike Agostini of Trinidad, who is running for Canada this year, was the highlight of the afternoon. Those who finished in the first three in their heat, earn the right to continue when the track program opens officially Saturday afternoon.

Tonight Robinson will carry his country's flag in the Games march-past of 34 nations in the opening ceremony. He is the only representative from the West Indies Island.

ONE ELIMINATION

Six of Canada's seven entries survived the preliminary round. The casualty was quarter-miler Doug Clement of Vancouver, a smoothie with plenty of international experience, who came up with one of his poorer times to finish fourth in his heat. Clement, elected captain of Canada's track team just a week ago, was clocked in 49.4, more than a second off his previous best.

George Shepherd of Port Colborne, Ont., and Terry Tobacco of Cumberland, B.C., who is Canada's best quarter-miler, both loafed in their heats. Tobacco was timed in 48.2 in his winning effort, the third best time among the quarter-milers, and won in a breeze. Shepherd's time was 49.6.

Agostini showed the best form of Canada's sprint entries. He

scampered home a comfortable first from the outside lane in 9.7 seconds, just 1-10 of a second off his games record, and noticeably slowed up in the last 25 yards.

Stan Levenson of Toronto, who reached the semi-finals in the 1956 Olympics, went all out for second place in 9.9 after a photo finish. Ronald Jones of Wales was placed first by a whisker and Smart Akaraka of Nigeria got third place.

Stu Cameron of Saskatoon was second in his heat in 10 seconds even and Pete Stanger of Montreal who specializes in the 120-yard hurdles qualified with a third place in 10.2.

TOUGH SCHEDULE

The sprint qualifiers face a tough afternoon Saturday. A six-hour second round, semi-finals 1 1/4 hours later and the finals 80 minutes after that.

A second round of the 440 is scheduled for Tuesday afternoon and the semi-finals and final on Thursday, July 24, two days before the 34-nation games close.

Scarboro Course Ideal Greens Fast, Amateurs Say

TORONTO (CP)—Canada's amateur golfers who will compete in the interprovincial team matches took their first practice round on the Scarborough course Thursday and came up with solid agreement on one point—the 6,615-yard layout is ideal and the greens are fast.

For what practice scores are worth, Bob Kidd of Vancouver showed the way with a four-under-par 67 and Ken Banks of Montreal was a stroke away at 68. Otherwise scores flirted with par and soared into the high 80s.

The interprovincial match for the Willingdon Cup and the Canadian junior championship will be decided Saturday in 36-hole medal play.

The defending champions from British Columbia and the 1957 runner-up Ontario quartet are considered the teams to beat although both squads, as well as

the six other teams, have several new players in their makeup.

POSSIBLE THREATS

Quebec and Alberta are also ranked as possible threats.

Mike Dowling, captain of the New Brunswick - Prince Edward Island team, summed up the opinion of many of the visitors who took a crack at the course.

"It's such a beautiful course, we were so busy sightseeing we found it hard to concentrate on golf," said Dowling.

Dowling, from Moncton, shot a 77 and Gene Mealey of Saint John matched it.

The Nova Scotia team, headed by Floyd Kelly of Dartmouth, found themselves generally in the high 70s or worse but still a bit jittery over their plane trip to Toronto. They sailed through a thunderstorm and reported lightning zipped above the plane's wings.

Herb Moford took over on the Detroit mound and Bauer tripled to score Lumpe and Siebern.

Boston's Brewer supported by a five-run uprising and Murray Wall's ninth-inning relief, won his first victory in more than a month as the Red Sox swept the three-game series from the Athletics.

Losie Tom Gorman was shelled in the fifth.

Red Sox slugger Ted Williams sat out the contest for a rest according to manager Mike Higgin. He was reported to have a slight stiffness in his shoulder.

Unrestricted T.V. Will Kill Major League Ball

WASHINGTON (AP)—Commissioner Ford Frick told Congress Wednesday that unrestricted televising of big league baseball games would destroy the sport within 10 years.

Frick asked the Senate antimonopoly subcommittee to approve legislation that would give baseball legal sanction to curb TV-radio broadcasts.

Minor league teams, he said, can't stand the competition of major league television.

"Minor league towns are being wrecked," Frick testified. "We have got to be able to handle this problem, or within 10 years there will be no television problem because there will be no baseball."

In addition to local telecasts, major league games now are seen every Saturday and Sunday on national hookups. Minor cities where games are played are supposed to be blacked out, but minor league officials contend this is ineffective.

SUPPORTS BILL

Frick supported a House-passed bill to provide broad anti-trust law exemptions for pro baseball, football, basketball and hockey.

Senator Joseph C. O'Mahoney (Dem.-Wyo) said the bill's exemptions are so sweeping baseball authorities should write down

for Congress the specific practices they want sanctioned by law.

Senator John A. Carroll (Dem.-Colo) said baseball "ought to clean its own lines" and accept reasonable restrictions without seeking a completely free hand.

He questioned whether Frick could do much policing if baseball were granted unrestricted rights.

Frick forecast that the majors will expand first to 10 from eight club leagues and then to 12 clubs. Eventually they would compete in six-team sections with interlocking schedules but with separate playoffs leading to the World Series.

Revenue from playoff games would help swell the players pension fund.

Frick also said he thinks some big league clubs "have gone completely haywire" in handing out huge bonuses to sign up promising youngsters. He estimated the majors have paid out between \$3,000,000 and \$4,000,000 this year for boys just out of high school or college.

O'Mahoney wanted to know why baseball didn't abolish bonuses and use the money to enlarge the present \$500,000 fund set up

to rescue failing minor league teams.

Frick said bonuses of \$100,000 and more apiece could be curtailed by reinstating a rule compelling clubs to keep bonus players on their own rosters for two years before farming them out. Also he said, they could make any player subject to draft by a major league team after one year in the minors. Frick called this a "rather socialist" method.

The unrestricted draft of top minor leaguers now affects only players with four years' experience.

The two-year provision for bonus babies was dropped last year.

Learning at the 17th hole that Jay Hebert was in with a 68, the 28-year-old tournament regular sank a 30-foot putt for a birdie duce. There he sent his approach to within two feet of the pin on the spectator-lined 18th.

Durelle Is Interested In Rematch With Mike Holt

MONTREAL (CP)—Yvon Durelle, still flushed with his successful defence of the British Empire light-heavyweight boxing crown, said Thursday he is interested in a rematch with South Africa's Mike Holt in Johannesburg "if the price is right and I can't get a shot at the old guy."

By the "old guy", Durelle, 28, was referring to 40-plus Archie Moore, the world's light-heavyweight champ.

Relaxing in his hotel room after Wednesday night's grueling battle with the South African challenger, Durelle was told the Transvaal National Sporting Club had cabled an offer for a return bout with Holt in Johannesburg later this year.

He was asked what he meant by the "right price."

"For one thing I haven't received the cable yet," Durelle replied. "But that sort of thing is up to my manager anyway. I handle just the fighting end."

Truman Gibson, president of the International Boxing Club, attended Wednesday night's bout, but made no definite statement on a Durelle-Moore match. Gibson left Thursday for his New York offices.

Holt, in the dressing room after the fight, a thoroughly beaten challenger, said he would like another track at Durelle. He was willing to fight in Canada but he said he wanted more time to get accustomed to climatic conditions here before future bouts. He arrived in Montreal only a week ago

Moon Colonies Are Considered

NEW YORK (AP)—Scientists already are mentally sketching the first rough blueprints for colonizing the moon.

They think "Moonvilles" peopled by lunar frontiersmen will inevitably come from the first testings of space by sputniks, explorers and vanguards.

Some challenges of lunar colonization were discussed recently, for example, at a meeting of the American Rocket Society and American Society of Mechanical Engineers.

The moon, 240,000 miles away, is dry, jagged and friendless. It has no protective blanket of air and oxygen to support human life. Colonists will have to take, or make, their own oxygen and their own food.

METEOR THREAT

Our earth's air does more for us than just keep us breathing. It burns up millions of tiny meteors streaking in from space. You see them as shooting stars. Without air to burn it up, would this celestial gunfire shoot down the moon colonist?

Perhaps—but perhaps the moon has enough atmosphere to destroy these speeding bits of metal and rock, says Clyde Tombaugh, the astronomer who discovered the planet Pluto.
