MRS REDPATH has endowed the Presbyterian Theological College, Montreal, with \$20,000.

A MEETING of the shareholders of the Bank of P. E. Island is called for Thursday, the 12th January, 1882, at 12 o'clock noon.

A NEW deep-water terminus, a branch railroad, and new frost-proof warehouse of the Acadia Steamship Co., were opened at Annapolis, N. S., on Monday last.

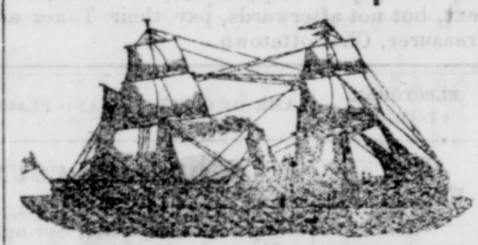
