Saints Meet Stadacona

THE ST. DUNSTON'S University football team will kick off their first game of the 1964 season in the Atlantic Coast Conference here Saturday when they will meet the Stadacona Saints. We talked with Ed Hilton, coach of the Saints, and he said that the team will have more of a local flavor than any of the teams which have been produced at the College during the last few years. The Red and Whites will be in the process of trying to rebuild. Hilton has a roster of 25 players and 17 of them will be Islanders.

Dave Morton who was a star on last year's team will be back with the Hilton forces this term and the big Torontonians will be in the center spot on Saturday. Dave was elected captain of the team by the players yesterday, at a team meeting.

Mike McPhee will be the only other veteran on offense. Mike will line up as fullback for Saturday's game. McPhee was the team's leading ground gainer in last year's campaign. John Driscoll who saw limited action as quarterback last year will be calling the Saints' offense. Fred Ripley who quarterbacked the Red and Whites last season is in-line for competition this term.

Hilton mentioned a couple of players who saw limited action with last year's team that have posted good starting positions for Saturday's game. Allan 'Posky' Connolly will start at right offensive end and Wes Mealer, who was used sparingly as a quarterback in the previous season, will be a flanker-back in the Saints' offense.

The remainder of the offensive club will be in their rookie year in the Atlantic Football Conference. Ed announced that Earl McDonald, a senior, will be the starting quarterback for the Saints High School team last season will start on offense against the Saints. Robert O'Brien will start at right offensive end and Ron Cole of Westbrook, Maine will complete Hilton's starting offensive team. The defensive line-up will be playing two-way ball with the Saints this season. Hilton said, "I'll use O'Brien in the right halfback slot on offense. He will be a defensive back on defense."

Vince Mulligan will also line up with the Hilton coached team against the Stadacona outfit. It was rumored earlier in the season that Mulligan had hung up his cleats for this season but the rumor was proven to be untrue. Vince will be out there Saturday doing his best to help his teammates. Vince will fill in as defensive half and will undoubtedly come up with some key plays this season.

They have already been beaten under their belts, they've defeated Shearwater twice, and they have been prepping since mid July, but our boys are optimistic and are looking forward to the game."

The same teams will be competing in this year's league and the schedule has been set. There will be some change in the loop that will not meet at all, for example, Acadia and Dalhousie who finished at the bottom of the league last year will not meet St. Francis Xavier or St. Mary's University.

NEW YORK (AP)—Of all the 1964 Olympic medalists in men's track and field, only Ralph Boston is favored to win a medal in his last major event. Boston faces by far the strongest broad-jump field ever assembled at Tokyo next month. But he is in top form, as his recent world record of 27 feet 4 1/2 inches and a wind-assisted 27-10 indicate.

Boston's United States teammates are led by an injury to Joseph Schiavone of 27 feet, as Phil Schinnick (26-3 1/2) and Gayle Hopkins (26-3 1/2). But the only other established 27-footer is Isor Terovanec of Russia, who held the world record for two years at

27-3 1/2 and has a 1964 best of 26-10. Another Russian, Leonid Barukovsky, placed Boston in the U.S.-Soviet dual meet at 26-4 1/2. Other top Europeans include Lynn Davies of Britain (26-4) and Pentti Eskola of Finland (26-2).

My picks, in order of finish: Boston, Terovanec, Shinnick, Davies, Barukovsky and Hopkins. The field in the triple jump has been thrown wide open by an injury to Joseph Schiavone, holder of Olympic champion and holder of the world record of 55 feet 10 1/2 inches, that has kept him out of action all season. Walker Gets Biggest Win

LONDON (AP)—John G. Walker received a check Tuesday for \$788,506, the biggest win ever made on a British one-penny soccer pool. The fortune was won on a pool called the treble chance, in which the object is to pick eight games ending in ties. Walker, 33, headed a syndicate of eight players whose entry was the only one selecting the top possible number of ties from English and Scottish League games played last Saturday.

Walker's wife, Enid said she picked the numbers from a charity near Leeds. They brought off their big score on an outlay of 70 cents which entitled them to 80 guesses at a penny a time. The record payoff was the result of blind chance, rather than skill. The previous record one-penny win was \$50,375 by Charlie Cooper, a London clerk, in March this year. The record for a pool win is held by Jimmy Gault, an Irish laborer who won \$50,000 but put down a two-penny stake. He won the money in 1959 and five years later in thrombosis.

League President Feels Confident

HALIFAX (CP)—The Maritime Senior Hockey League—won't be on ice for a few weeks yet but league president, Harry Trainer is confident of a "better than ever" season. Formerly the Nova Scotia Senior Hockey League, the four-team circuit was renamed at the end of last season because of its New Brunswick affiliation. Trainer gave a number of reasons why he feels "this season will be the best we've had." But a new ruling adopted by the league this month was the best. Halifax Schoners, New Glasgow Rangers, Windsor Maple Leafs and the Hawks will each submit a \$500 bond to the league before the season opens. Should any team decide to withdraw before the completion of the schedule it will forfeit its bond.

"This ensures the safety of the league," said Trainer. A team won't threaten to withdraw until the season is well under way. "It gives us more consideration now." The bond will be called upon through the season. If a team receives a fine from the league, the bond will ensure its payment. Trainer, in his third season as president, said the league is attempting to prove its fans. NNSHL teams occasionally

went on the road with only a handful of regulars. Juniors or low-calibre players were used on an ad hoc basis for management. Games were often late starting because of the tardy arrival of visiting teams. Trainer said MSHL clubs face strictly-enforced penalties for such practices. Teams citing less than 10 "registered" players are fined \$500. Clubs showing up with less than 10 players face a fine and forfeit the 10 cents-a-head on the gate normally visiting fans bring. 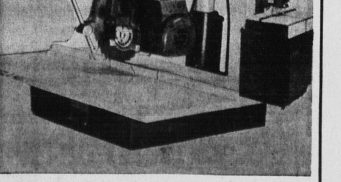
