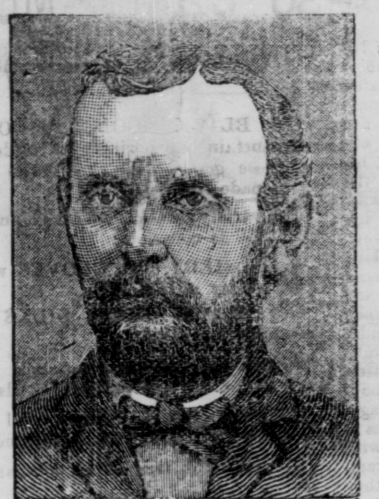

The "Femme Sole"

THE Liberal Leader called upon his party, on Friday, to vote down the proposition that unmarried women owning property and performing the public duties appertaining thereto should be empowered to vote in Provincial elections;—and his party obeyed the call. That is to say, they refused an additional security for the interests of property-holders and an additional guarantee that we shall have our future legislation and administration in respect to Provincial affairs on the lines of temperance and morality. Everyone knows that women are more temperate and have greater interests in temperance than men. Everyone knows that, taken together, they are purer and better than men, and that their instincts and motives are higher. The Christian world, indeed, appreciates more and more the truth of Wordsworth's description:

Perfect woman, nobly planned,
To warn, to comfort and to command;
A being breathing thoughtful breath,
And yet a spirit still and bright,
With something of angelic light.

It is a well-known fact that true Liberals throughout the English-speaking world are working towards the political enfranchisement of women in the hope that purer laws may be passed and enforced. But our Liberal Leader (save the mark) ridicules the idea and pours contempt upon the heads of the men who propose that single women owning property may vote at Provincial elections. We marvel that Mr. Bell was silent when the Premier was hurling his sneers at those desiring to enfranchise the women of P. E. Island who are free agents and own property. We wonder at Mr. Warburton. We are astonished that any true Liberal would, on any consideration, oppose the liberal and reasonable proposition of the Leader of the Opposition. A limiting the force of the plea that women are not much interested in public affairs, that they are compelled to devote their attention to the home, and do not, therefore, care to study political questions, is there anything so difficult in respect to the roads and bridges, and schools, and temperance legislation of this little Province, that any intelligent woman cannot readily comprehend any political issue which may be raised? The honorable member for Wellington said truly, a few days ago, that it should ever be borne in mind that this Island is not so large, or so fully populated, or so wealthy, or so varied in its interests, as many municipalities;—and many municipalities accord to unmarried women, owning property, the right to vote!

The excuse of Mr. Warburton and Dr. Jenkins would be a good one if there were really any danger that the bill would be lost if the proposal were adopted. Is it to be supposed that the Legislative Council, anxious to conserve the interests of property, anxious to promote temperance and public virtue, would refuse to pass the bill because of a provision that single women owning property may vote? A few years ago, if we mistake not, the Legislature passed a bill or resolution setting forth that such women should be enfranchised. Is it likely that they would now repudiate their action in this regard? It is not likely. Therefore, the excuse—the sole excuse—of members supporting the Government for rejecting the amendment is merely a "blind" to cover their subservience to a high and dry Tory, parading as a Liberal Leader. They will probably discover, ere long, that a mistake has been made.

The Liberal Leader found great fault with the Leader of the Opposition because he, following the practice of British lawyers in every age since William the Conqueror was crowned at Westminster, called a single woman a *femme sole*. Mr. Peters should know that "a rose by any other name would smell as well," and that our intelligent and virtuous unmarried women are not to be sneered at—particularly when they own property—whether their influence is restricted to the home or carried into the wider sphere of the Province in which they have, equitably with the men, an interest and stake, and whether they are referred to in law French or plain English.

Sherwood Cemetery.

At the annual meeting of the Sherwood Cemetery Company the report of the directors for the past year was adopted. It is as follows:—

Owing to an amendment in the Act of Incorporation passed in the last session of the Legislature, the report herewith submitted for your approval embraces the operations of the Company from 3rd of February, 1891, until 6th April, 1892, inclusive.
During that period the receipts from all sources have amounted to \$417, including \$14 received by the Secretary for repairs to monuments, and to be disbursed by him to Messrs. Cairns & McLean. Apart from this sum the entire receipts are as follows:

Sale of plots and arrears collected on plots sold..... 70 00

Twenty eight interments were made since the last report was submitted—the entire number of burials to date being eight hundred and nine. During the past year much improvement has been made in the cemetery. In order to provide the keeper with suitable accommodation for storage of his implements and machinery. An addition of 12x16 feet has been made to the building heretofore used as a stable, thus enlarging it to double its former size, and a neat and substantial fence six feet high and 100 feet in length has been constructed in the rear of this building. This work which would have cost at least \$25 for labor alone, if done under contract has been performed under the superintendence of the secretary at the small outlay of \$5 besides the cost of materials. A hedge of about 500 young spruces was sent out by Mr. Noah Harper last spring, extending from the new fence to the gateway near the station, and the hedge along the railway line was replanted where it had been destroyed by fire. Some forty ornamental trees were also planted by him at distances of twenty feet apart, commencing at the entrance near Brackley Point Road and extending about midway through the cemetery. Upwards of twenty tons of ashes, gratuitously given to the Company by Mr. Gasworthy, Railway Superintendent, have been piled upon the roadways during the past year, and the Directors have made arrangements for procuring a large additional quantity during the coming season.
For the more efficient management of the company's affairs it was found necessary to amend its Act of Incorporation last session by changing its corporate name to the Sherwood Cemetery Company, reducing its directors to five, vesting in all plot holders the right to vote, simplifying the mode of executing by laws and facilitating the mode of collecting arrears on shares. This act was passed at no expense to the company excepting the fee of ten dollars exacted by the Legislature. The late keeper having resigned, Mr. Ambrose Watkins was appointed in his stead in November last. The directors have reason to believe that the interests of the company have been served by the change thus made in the keepership. Mr. Watkins appears to be an efficient and trustworthy man who takes an active interest in his work and considerable improvement is visible in the appearance of the cemetery since he entered upon his duties.
During the past summer the secretary and one of the directors made upwards of thirty visits to the cemetery, spending several hours at each visit, for the purpose of directing and supervising the keeper in the discharge of his duties and of seeing that all work undertaken by him for plot holders was satisfactorily performed.
The Directors are pleased to state that agreeably to their suggestion in last year's report, a number of plot holders raised and graded their plots last summer, and have sown them down with lawn or grass seed. Several very handsome monuments have also been erected tending to adorn and improve the cemetery.

In concluding this report your Directors desire to thank those of the shareholders who have so generously subscribed to the fund raised last year for the practical interest they have thus manifested in the cemetery, and your Directors would express the hope that those who have not hitherto subscribed may be induced to do so during the coming year in order that the caretaking and improvement of plots may be made general if possible.
