Contract Bridge By Josephine Culbertson WHICH BID WOULD YOU CHOOSE? An interesting question of bidding was raised in today's deal, played at match-point duplicate.

At several tables East opened the bidding with the high, preemptive bid of four spades, and, very obviously, this presented something of a problem to the respective Souths. Several players in that position doubled the four-spade call, and whenever this was the sequence, North took out the double to five hearts. East then kept quiet, awaiting developments, but the South players felt (with reason) that they could not safely bid further, and so five hearts became the final contract. This was not unsatisfactory to the East-West players, inasmuch as the declarer made six or seven hearts, depending on their guess for the trump queen.

At rubber bridge, there can be little doubt that South's best action over a four-spade shutout is the double, giving North the option of bidding or passing, because the four notrump might easily come to grief. However, at match-point play, where the element of risk need not be given as much consideration, there are grounds for feeling that the four-trump call is superior to the double.

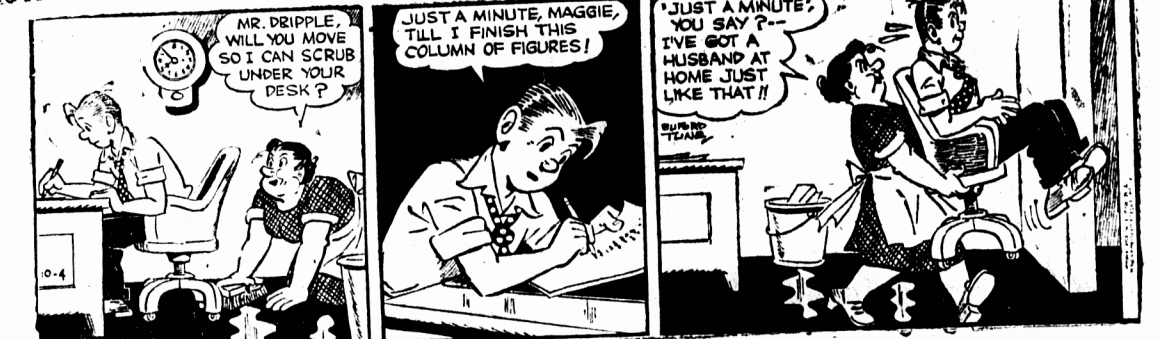

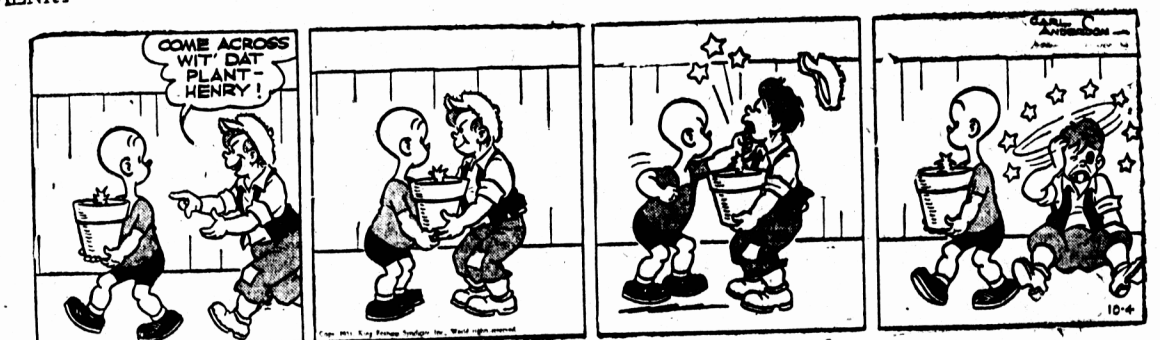

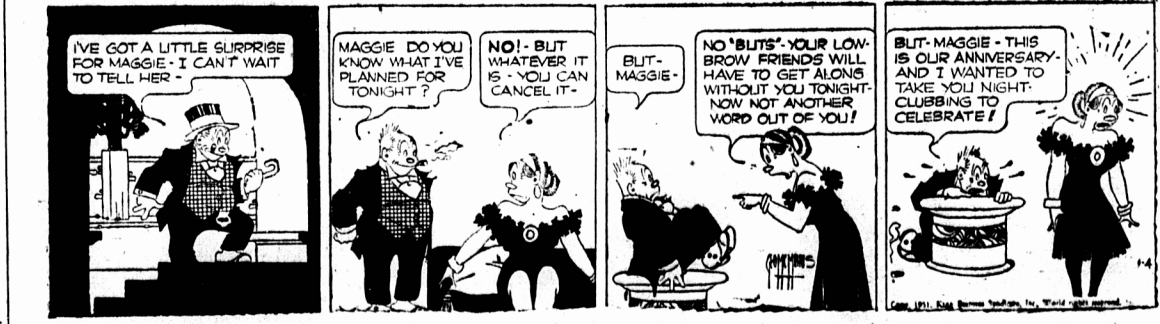
