THE vessel loaded with produce by Mr. Bridges for the Halifax market has been cut out to the three tides where she now lies awaiting a favorable wind.

TRAINS LATE.—The train from Souris was nearly an hour late on Saturday evening; and "a passenger," informs us that the train connecting with the "Northern Light" at Georgetown was nearly five hours making the passage to Charlottetown.

LOSS OF THE REATA.—A telegram received by Messrs. Welsh & Owen, from London today, reports that the crew of the brig *Reata*, were picked off the vessel, and arrived safe in Great Britain. The *Reata* had a valuable cargo consisting of starch, canned lobsters and other island produce.

FOR SPRING PARK.—We learn that a number of the windmills heretofore used for the railway tanks have been cast aside and are for sale. Would it not be well if our City Fathers would purchase two of these for use at Spring Park. Two would be sufficient to keep Spring Park tank full.

A GREAT many citizens complain about the dilapidated state of the pumps at Spring Park. One pump there is entirely out of order, while the other can be used with great difficulty. Cannot our City fathers afford to spend a small sum to keep those pumps going. It is a great inconvenience for citizens to be compelled to wait at the Spring three and four hours for a barrel of water.

LATEST NEWS NOTES.

IRELAND.

It is said that the Land League movement is extending in the North of Ireland. The real state of the country it is difficult if not impossible to discover.

Lord Lurgan, now invalided at Brighton, has refused a petition of 600 tenants, asking fifty per cent abatement of their rents. He will give ten per cent, but no more. This is the first conflict between a landlord and his tenants on the rent question in the North. Lord Lurgan's estate is a model one, and the tenants are rich.

The Lord Lieutenant of one of the most important counties in Ireland informed a New York *Herald* correspondent, a few days ago, that not one-fourth of the illegal and seditious acts of the people were reported. He also said that he could personally testify to at least twenty outrages that had occurred in his district during the last two months. They were not reported because they are now so frequent that no pretence is made reporting them fully, even to Dublin Castle. Many agents and landlords are under police protection.
