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Private Enterprise Data Used In Quebec Divisions

QUEBEC (CP) - Quebec officials, in dividing the province into 10 new administrative regions, took their cue partly from private enterprise. Premier Jean Lesage has described the new regions as "poles of growth around which regional economic development would be centred."

The regional system was drawn up by the Bureau of Economic Research of the provincial department of industry and commerce. The bureau decided from the start that it couldn't do the job simply on the basis of theories about the nature of Quebec's economic life.

It needed detailed facts about population, the workings of various economic and social groups, and the operations of both private companies and government. An important approach lay in the study of the sales territories of private companies.

This survey allowed the planners to locate the centres of commerce for the various regions. In surveying the work of government departments, the bureau looked at their current regional organizations and the branch offices operated in them by the various departments.

Regions Subdivided

There are 25 sub-regions in the 10-region system. The government seeks to establish uniform services for all of Quebec. There are now 40 different "division patterns" in effect in the government's administrative system.
