ISLAND STEAMERS.—The Princess of Wales went to Summerside last night to relieve the St. Lawrence, which came to the city en route to Pictou, where she intends going on the Marine Slip for repairs.

QUEER.—In New York a few days ago, Charles Williams, colored, sentenced to five years and six months in Sing Sing for stealing an umbrella. Jacob Sharp stole Broadway and is still at liberty. Such are the eccentricities of justice.

CORRECTION.—The accidental insertion of the figure 6 instead of a 4, in that part of the Water Commissioners' Report dealing with the increased duty on pipes, gates, hydrants, &c., made the total increase over the duty chargeable last year, read "nearly \$10,600," instead of "nearly \$14,600," as written.

FOUND DEAD.—A woman named Mrs. Andrew Murray, about seventy years of age, living at Toney River, a few miles from Pictou, was found dead on the road last Wednesday. She was going to see a friend when she left the house, and was apparently in her usual good health.

JUDGMENT GIVEN.—In Halifax, on Thursday, judgment was given in the case of W. S. Symonds vs. Mrs. Fishwick (an action for payment under contract for certain repairs to S. S. M. A. Starr) in favor of Mrs. Fishwick for \$185.55, with costs of counter claim, to be deducted from Symonds' original judgment.

CHRISTMAS DINNER.—Mr. R. R. Fitzgerald, in a letter published in another column, again solicits contributions towards a Christmas Dinner for the poor. Last year he was the means through which the heart of many a poor man and woman was made glad, and we trust that this year he will be even more successful.

COMMERCIAL UNION.—To the call to attend a meeting at Montague Bridge to discuss the question of Commercial Union with the United States no one responded. Farmers, and Dominion and Local Representatives were invited, but no one went. It is said, however, that the meeting will take place later on. We learn that there is not much stock taken in Commercial Union in King's County.

NOMINATED.—Nominations for the seat in the House of Commons for Shelbourne Co., N. S., made vacant by the resignation of Mr. Thomas Robertson, liberal, was made on Thursday. Mr. Robertson was again nominated, and General Laurie, his Conservative opponent last February, is again opposing him.

In Yarmouth, Mr. Lovitt, liberal, and Mr. T. B. Crosby, Conservative, were nominated.

BAND INSTRUMENTS.—Messrs. Miller Bros., of this city, have lately been doing a very good business in the way of supplying brass band outfits. Some time ago they fitted out the Souris and Rustico Bands, and a few days ago they fitted an order for the St. Dunstan's College Band. Each set consisted of ten instruments, exclusive of bass and side drums and cymbals. We understand that the instruments have in every case given good satisfaction.

NEW BOILER.—The new boiler manufactured for the electric light company by Messrs. McKinnon and McLean, is being placed in position in the station to-day, and will be in working order by the last of next week. The boiler, which is of steel, double-crowned, is 13 feet 8 inches in length, and 5 feet one inch in diameter, with a dome 2 feet 6 inches by three feet. It is of 3-inch plate, has 53 4-inch tubes, and 7 longitudinal stays 1 1/8 in diameter. The boiler has been submitted to a test of 160 pounds to the square inch. The workmanship reflects credit on the manufacturers.

The lecture was greatly appreciated throughout. At the close a vote of thanks was heartily tendered the lecturer for his rare treat. Rev. Mr. Hogg presided."

We understand Mr. Tanton has been offered a position on a leading daily in Toronto. Last night officers Doyle and Costello made another unsuccessful attempt to arrest Fred Bevan. They visited Fred's residence, on Pownall Street, at about eight o'clock, and finding the doors locked, secreted themselves behind a wagon in the yard. WHAT IS THE PLOT?

A SUSPICIOUS CONVERSATION Overheard by a Little Girl.

CREATES A PANIC

HALIFAX, Dec. 9.

George's Island is one of the strongest forts about this well fortified city, and is in the middle of the harbor, opposite the business portion of the city. Last night, in a blinding snowstorm, a Sergeant's daughter, about 16 years of age, heard three men talking near the gun cotton tanks. One said to the other, "You are not going to leave me here to do your dirty work." She immediately communicated what she heard to the soldiers, who rushed in the direction indicated. The men took the alarm and made off in a boat, and in the darkness all trace of them was lost. The fact was at once telephoned to the military headquarters. The sentries were doubled, and the police were instructed to watch all vessels in the harbor and all wharves, but no trace of the men could be found. It was a sleepless night for the military authorities, though now they say there was nothing in it and refuse to give information. But the above are facts, the gun cotton tanks are on the opposite side of the Island from the lighthouse. No one but soldiers are on the Island, and what the men were doing there is the question. It was discovered that the cover of a new tank was taken off and this added to the alarm.

WARLIKE RUMBLINGS. Placing Russian Troops ON A WAR FOOTING.

Military Council Summoned.

CRACOW, Dec. 9.

An order has been issued placing the Fifth, Seventh, Eighth and Eleventh Russian army corps on a war footing.

VIENNA, Dec. 9.

The Emperor has summoned another military council for to-day. The war office is taking measures to permanently increase the facilities by which troops can be mobilized and place Galicia in a better position for defence these preparations will enable a large force to be thrown into Galicia at the shortest notice. No extra force will be stationed in Galicia.

The Emperor presided to-day at a military council, which decided not to summon the delegations for the present, as Russia had apparently stopped her menacing movements. Measures for the mobilization of troops were arranged, should Russia continue massing troops on the frontier. The public are not unduly excited.

The Big Raft.

POIT LEPEREUX, Dec. 9.

The S. S. Miranda, with the big raft in tow, passed outward at 7 o'clock this evening. The wind is north northeast, and sky partly cloudy. The water is smooth.

Petitioning the Government.

TORONTO, Dec. 9.

The County Court judges of Ontario met here to-day and decided to petition the Dominion Government for an increase of their salaries.

The Scott Act.

ST. THOMAS, ONT., Dec. 9.

During the past three months Scott Act Inspector Beaton has secured 32 convictions in West Elgin, the total fines aggregating \$3,500.

The four year old daughter of Andrew Thom, of Norway, fell on a red hot stove during her mother's absence, to-day, and was roasted alive.

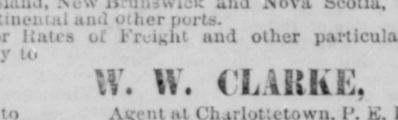
