Pope Pius Has Warning For Catholic Psychologists

VATICAN CITY (Reuters) — The Pope warned Roman Catholic psychologists Thursday against probing too deeply into the "interior domain" of a patient's personality.

"The 20th century still demonstrates unhappy examples of these aberrations" in allowing torture and violent means to be used in judicial proceedings. He said no one would deny that modern psychology deserved approval "from the moral and religious point of view."

He said psychologists must not consider themselves authorized by government regulations or laws to offend against moral law. "It is the characteristic of totalitarian states," he said, "that they have no care for the means but use without distinction anything that will serve their ends, without regard for the demands of moral law."

SOMETIMES ACT FREELY The Pope said a psychologist can act freely when the patient shows he attaches no importance to what he reveals directly or indirectly through his behavior. "But there is a large part of his interior world that a person discloses only to a few confidants and that he defends against the intrusion of others."

Backs Down On No Union Jack Plan For Kiwanis Clubs

TORONTO (CP) — A Chicago Kiwanis official, who wrote Canadian Kiwanis clubs proposing that the Union Jack not be displayed at their meetings, says he has dropped the proposal and turned it over to the Kiwanis international board.

Bert Dean, secretary of Edgebrook Kiwanis, Chicago, was seeking support for a resolution to be tabled at the Kiwanis international convention June 29 that the Canadian Red Ensign replace the Union Jack at Kiwanis meetings.

It has been traditional for the Union Jack to stand beside the Stars and Stripes at Kiwanis meetings.

The proposal brought a wave of criticism from Kiwanis clubs across Canada.

Mr. Dean, in explaining his anti-Union Jack proposal, said in a telephone interview in Chicago:

"I am anxious to honor Canada alone by displaying her flag with ours. We are not interested in the spreading of a former empire by showing the Union Jack."

"After all you are a new country and having trouble getting action on your own. We just wanted to give you a neighborly hand in bringing recognition around."

"And also you're here on our continent so we want to give you a hand in settling your problems."
