Our progress in the future ought to be much more rapid than in the past. His Honor also referred to the movement towards fruit production, and pointed to Inkerman Farm as an example by which other farmers might be encouraged.

NEWS NOTES.

The true Treasury gold reserve at the close of business on Thursday, with all withdrawals and deposits accounted for, is \$95,382,528.

Pig iron has sustained a smart drop in the market, the fall being due to cablegrams from America stating that the production of pig iron there was on the increase.

The London Times publishes a despatch from Shanghai saying that the Chinese regard the inquiry into the massacre of Christians at Kucheng as a mockery, and have begun to release the prisoners without consulting the British consul.

H. M. S. Magician, reported from Montreal to have grounded in Lake St. Peter on her trip from Montreal to Quebec, arrived there in due time last Wednesday and anchored in the stream. Her pilot denies the rumor of the grounding.

The London Telegraph says the retirement is announced of three members of the stock exchange who made fortunes in the recent South African mining boom.

Mr. Greene, M. P., publishes a letter from an important English official in Uganda saying that Maj. Lohaine, the British officer, who ordered the execution of the British trader, Stokes, shot 100 of Stokes' porters, besides seizing all of Stokes' ivory and baggage.

The Spanish government having heard a report that two warships were being built in Great Britain in behalf of the Cuban rebels, the foreign office is making inquiries into the truth of the report.

A despatch from Sunderland, Norway, says advices have been received from Angmagalik, on the east coast of Greenland, that about the end of July a vessel believed to be the Fram, which conveyed Dr. Nansen and his expedition from Norway in search of the North Pole, was seen imbedded in a drift of ice off Senikfod.

The British steamer Taft, just from Cuba, September 10th, brings news of a serious state of affairs at Banes, an important fruit port on the northern coast. The Taft reports that Banes has been evacuated by the Spaniards after a feeble resistance; that the entire northern section of the island is now in the hands of the insurgents, and Gibara itself, which is one of the strongest and best fortified cities on the coast, is in a perilous position.

LECTURE AT SOURIS.

In official circles here it is fully expected that the decision of the Imperial Government with reference to fast Atlantic service will be known shortly. A correspondent states that according to latest information which reached him, the matter was in a fair way to be finally disposed of. The Inter-departmental committee appointed by the home government to report on Huddart's scheme has presented its report and it is now before the Secretary for the Colonies.

Yesterday a telegram was received announcing that Mr. Patterson had died suddenly. The deceased was one of the oldest and most prominent members of the Sons of Temperance in New Brunswick. For several years he occupied the office of Grand Sorle.
