TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

The Massacre of Christians.
LONDON, Oct. 26.
Details have been received of the massacre of native Christians of Uganda, Africa, by order of King Mwangi. The massacre began in June and was directly due to the refusal of a Christian lad, acting as the King's page, to commit an abominable crime. Many Christians were tortured, mutilated and speared, and 32 were burned alive together. The appeals of the Missionaries for a cessation of atrocities were unavailing.

More Fires.
OTTAWA, Oct. 26.
A fire in Aylmer, eight miles from the capital, this morning destroyed \$8,000 worth of property.
ST. THOMAS, Ont., Oct. 26.
A very destructive fire took place this morning in the village of Fingal, burning the principal business blocks. Loss about \$30,000.

Mackerel Bonanza.
HALIFAX, Oct. 26.
Persons who have arrived in the city from Prospect and Portuguese Coves say that the fishermen have had a perfect bonanza in the way of mackerel. Thousands of barrels have been caught within the past week, mostly No. 1 mackerel, and it is estimated that the district will net \$10,000 from their fish.

The Supreme Court.
HALIFAX, Oct. 26.
The Supreme Court opened to-day, but no cases were tried. The suit of W. F. McCoy against the Herald was set down for Tuesday next. It is a suit for \$20,000 for alleged libellous articles published in the Herald and Mail last April.

The Church and the Knights of Labor.
BALTIMORE, Oct. 26.
Archbishops Ireland, Feehan, Williams, Kehrick and Ryan arrived to-night. It is understood they will meet to-morrow to determine the attitude of the Catholic Church towards the Knights of Labor as an organization.

The Rothschild Failure.
TORONTO, Oct. 26.
Rothschild & Co's. safes were opened this afternoon, and as expected contained little else than cheap jewelry. No trace has yet been found of the members of the firm.

Affairs in Rangoon.
LONDON, Oct. 26.
Advices from Rangoon say the officials of Burma state that it will be impossible to subjugate that country under four years, and that a large army will be needed to restore order.

Critical Times in Capetown.
CAPE TOWN, Oct. 26.
Ten thousand ponds have invaded Keiboland, burning kraals and committing depredations. The government is raising volunteers to resist them. The situation is critical.

A Fine Remitted.
HALIFAX, Oct. 26.
The Department of Customs has remitted the \$200 fine imposed on the American schooner Pearl Nelson, for permitting her crew to land at Arichat before reporting.

The Fisheries Protection Service.
OTTAWA, Oct. 26.
The fishing season being nearly over, the Government cruisers Critic and Lindsay will be put out of commission at the end of the present month.

The British Fleet.
HALIFAX, Oct. 26.
The North American squadron of the British fleet sailed for Bermuda to-day.
