

Bay State Pat Takes New Record At S'side Track

Bay State Pat, owned and driven by Mr. Andrew Perry of Summerside, turned in the fastest mile of the meet at the Raceway Stadium in Summerside last evening, being clocked in 2:17, in the seventh dash of a well classified race card and setting a new record for the sleek pacer in doing so.

After finishing sixth in the third dash, Bay State Pat broke out of the pack at the three quarter pole in the seventh and came on to win easily over Jay's Hope who had copped the third heat quite handily and paid the high win ticket for the night of \$26.80.

Ronald G. and Vella Gratian were the double heat winners, with a daily double ticket on Lou Kalmuck and Ronald G. paying \$163.40.

Quinnellas on the fourth and sixth races paid \$19.00 and \$3.50 respectively. It was ladies night at the Raceway Stadium and about seven hundred fans enjoyed a good race meet.

High Scores At Skeet Shoot

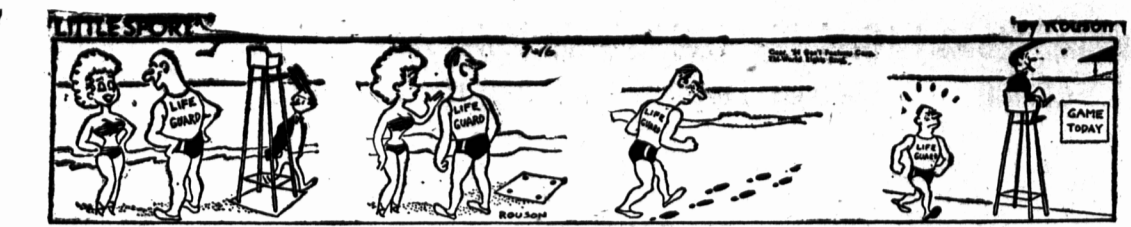

From here we would rationalize that Tingley is a business man who figures that the Maritime Major Hockey League has run its course. He owned the greatest number of players of any club in the circuit and in order to get full value for his players he had to make the first move towards their disposal.

However we wouldn't go so far as to write an obituary for the M.H.L. yet. The M.H.L. has survived some crucial moments during its existence and has proved itself a resilient body especially in regard to finances.

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Halifax Atlantics Sell Six Players To Sudbury Wolves

HALIFAX, (CP)—Halifax Atlantics announced Thursday that they have sold all six players they own to Sudbury Wolves of the Ontario Hockey Association.

It was a move that apparently meant the end of major series hockey in Halifax, and perhaps for the Maritimes.

Sold were Bill Ford, Jackie Muckle Hollett, Doug McPhee, Bob Bowness, Carroll Bloom and goalie Roy McMeekin.

Halifax Hockey Club Ltd. said it still owns the franchise for the club in the Maritime Major Hockey League.

A club spokesman said: "We still own the franchise and the equipment... and we are prepared to give them to any responsible organization or group which wishes to operate in the Allan Cup league or a major series league."

Followers of the sport, however, doubted whether any new group could find players of a calibre to replace those sold for competition in a major league.

And with the Atlantics out of the picture, some doubted whether the three remaining teams—Sydney Millionaires, Glace Bay Miners and Charlottetown Islanders—would want to continue.

Atlantics said their reasons for the sale were:
1. There is no assurance that the league will operate next season, especially in view of a dispute between Glace Bay and Charlottetown.

Attendance at the Halifax Forum dropped 39,000 last year as compared to the previous season, even though Atlantics won their second consecutive Alexander Cup.

The players would become free agents unless sold before September and the league did not operate. They had cost thousands of dollars and the money from their sale will be used to help offset last season's deficit.

Fletcher Ties Rosburg For Golf Tourney Lead

VANCOUVER (CP)—Pat Fletcher of Saskatoon tied Bob Rosburg of San Francisco late Thursday for the lead in the Canadian open golf championship.

The big Saskatoon pro shot a 70, one under par, in the second round to match Rosburg's 145 for 36 holes.

Fletcher came down the back stretch with a par at every hole and missed the great chance to get in front at the 18th.

He began the day's play facing a two-stroke deficit, a first-round 65 against the sensational eight-under-par 63 Rosburg uncorcked Wednesday.

Neither Fletcher nor Rosburg could duplicate their first-round play but this time Fletcher was the leader.

The San Franciscan, not so sure of himself with his irons, finished with a 72. Fletcher was one under par with 35 going out and came back in even par 35.

At the 18th, a par five 460-yarder where birdies and even eagles have been gleefully gathered, Fletcher needed a birdie four to get in front.

But Fletcher put his tee shot into the rough, in thick grass to the right, and had to use a No. 8 iron to get over trees back on the fairway. It was one of the few times he found himself in serious trouble through two rounds.

He placed his third on the green 40 feet from the pin. His long, curling putt curved around the edge of the cup and stopped 20 inches past it. From there he putted out confidently.

Lord Alexander En Route To B.C.
LONDON, (CP)—Field Marshal Earl Alexander, Britain's 82-year-old defence minister and former governor-general of Canada, left London Thursday night on his way to Vancouver to open the British Empire Games July 30.

Lord Alexander will go first to Washington for talks with United States defence officials until July 21. Following a tour of military bases in Maryland, Florida, Texas and California, he will fly to Vancouver July 29.

A defence ministry spokesman said Lord Alexander's plans during his stay in Canada are private matter between himself and the lieutenant-governor of British Columbia, Clarence Wallace.

"The minister wants to relax, or go fishing, or whatever one does on a holiday," the spokesman said. "He is leaving it all to his hosts."
