Contract Bridge

A FINE PERFORMANCE

The declarer's play in the following deal was worthy of notice.

North dealer.
North-South vulnerable.

♠ A 9 7 6 5
♥ A
♦ Q 5
♣ K 10 8 6 3

♠ Q J 10
♥ 8 4 2
♦ Q J 10
♣ 6 5

♠ K 8 4 3
♥ A J 9 7 4 3 2
♦ A 2

The bidding:
North East South West
1 ♠ 3 ♣ 4 ♠ Pass
5 ♠ 7 ♣ 6 ♠ Double
Pass Pass Pass

North, with a weakish hand containing five spades and five clubs, opened with the lower-ranking suit in order to have an easy rebid (of one spade) over a heart or diamond response from partner. East's preemptive bid made things somewhat difficult for North-South, but they nevertheless reached the slam contract which was correct for their combined holdings.

West opened the spade king. The ace was played from dummy, declarer discarding a heart, and then a club returned to the king. Now South ruffed a club—not because he wanted to establish the suit, but because it was vital to reduce his own trump length. South felt morally sure that West's double of the slam had been based on all four of the missing trumps (since the bid made by West's partner had promised nothing, defensively) and South planned his play accordingly.

Now South led to the heart ace and ruffed another club, reducing himself to five trumps. He cashed the heart king and ruffed a heart in dummy with the five spot. Now he ruffed a spade, which brought him down to four trumps—the same length as West's—and, with the stage set, led a low diamond toward the blank queen. It did not matter whether West put up the king or ducked; in the former case he would have to lead from the 10-8-7 into South's A-J-9; in the latter case, the queen would hold and when South then ruffed a black card with his trump nine, West could overruff, but then he "end-played."
