George Latham remembers the days. Nov. 24, his last fight, and the former boxer, trainer and critic recalls how he beat Dick Hunt Sr. in a 10-round fight. Latham says he could have earned a living as a boxer but it would have been hard. The money wasn't good enough.

Latham says he was paid \$1,500.

He instructed a school for boxers here for a couple of years under the name of Professor Latham but it ended with the First World War. He also operated a similar school in Detroit.

In a career that spanned 37 years, Latham fought 369 times. His rec' or: 369 wins, nine losses.

He won the Canadian light-weight championship in 1905 by defeating Nat Mackley in Oil City, near Sarria, Ont.

## Emile Griffin Is 2-1 Favorite

LONDON (AP) - Emile Griffith, world waterweight boxing champion, is a 2-1 favorite to defeat Britain's Dave Charley in his non-title 10-rounder tonight.

Griffith, from New York City, successfully defended his title against Brian Curran, British welterweight, two months ago.

Charley is the British light-weight champion Griffith is expected to weigh 48 pounds at London's Wembley Indoor Stadium, and may be as much as a 10-pound advantage.
