

National Employment Committee Here Today

Prominent men from many parts of Canada and the Atlantic Provinces will gather in Charlottetown today, when the National Employment Committee and the Regional Employment Committee both convene for a period of three days in the Charlottetown Hotel.

When the Unemployment Insurance Commission was established more than 15 years ago, the National Employment Committee was set up to advise and assist the Commission in carrying out the functions of the Employment service. As the name implies, the Committee is organized on a national basis.

The Regional Committee has similar functions, but its deliberations are limited to the Atlantic Provinces, and it reports to the National body. With the exception of the permanent secretary of the national body, none of the members of either committee receives a salary. The members receive a daily stipend when they meet, and are allowed travelling expenses. Each of the committees is composed of an equal number of men or women representing workers and employers. Many towns and cities also have local office advisory committees.

Submits Report At C.N.I.B. Meeting — In his annual report of the Prince Edward Island Advisory Board to the Canadian National Institute for the Blind, Judge C. St. Clair Tractor, Chairman, stated that the number of blind persons on the register stood at 164, as a result of 10 new registrations against 12 deaths and 12 removals from the province.

During the past year, he said, six persons had received full time employment through the C.N.I.B. and three persons part-time. Fifteen other persons are working independently of the Institute.

Speaking at the annual meeting of the organization last week, Judge Tractor outlined some of the fields in which the blind find employment and also the various them.

Recreational activities for the blind have been carried out by various organizations in the City who have made it possible for the blind of this area to become more active socially he continued. Judge Tractor went on to summarize the efforts which have been made on a National scale to have legislation enacted granting a special cost of blindness allowance without a means test to all blind persons over 18 years of age. He also cited the provisions made to increase the blindness allowance based on a more liberal means test.

Judge Tractor concluded by explaining the growth and development of the Prevention of Blindness program and the methods by which this program is assisted, and expressed his gratitude to all who had made possible the continuous advance and expansion of the Institute.
