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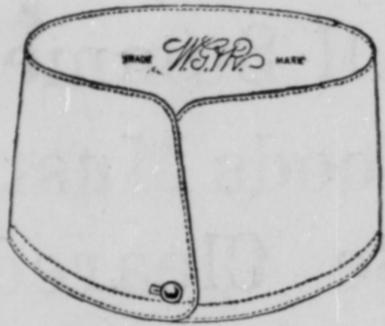

## ALASKAN BOUNDARY SITUATION

### Reassuring Statement from Washington

NEGOTIATIONS PROCEEDING FA-  
VORABLY.

Amid Renewed Expressions of Good  
Will.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

WASHINGTON, July 26.—The acuteness  
of the Alaskan Boundary situation has  
been so much relieved as a result of con-  
ference yesterday between Secretary Hay  
and the British charge, Mr. Tower that  
these who have taken the most active part  
in the negotiations feel they can leave the  
city for the summer vacation.

One of the effects of renewing the direct  
negotiations in Washington is to establish  
that the Anglo American Commission can-  
not reassemble in Quebec on August 2nd  
That date is only a week off and as yet Great  
Britain has not named a commissioner to  
take the place of the late Lord Herschell.

The strong language used by Sir Wil-  
frid Laurier and Sir Charles Tupper has  
not found expression in the official  
negotiations which are proceeding with  
every evidence of good will.

### WESTWARD HO!

At this delightful season of the year a  
days drive through any of the flourishing  
settlements of this Island is so healthful  
and invigorating that many avail them-

way affords. The writer being one of

being Coleman or Blanc. It rained tor-  
rents the day previously and the roads  
were in a bad condition, but the morning  
gave promise of a fine day. The air was  
bracing, and after the heavy rain, was filled  
with a fair proportion of ozone which  
greatly increased its tonic effect. Passing  
through the beautiful and thriving settle-  
ments of St. Eleanor's and Miscouche our  
speed was necessarily slackened when  
we came to the Corduroy road which ex-  
tends from a short distance west of Mis-  
couche, almost to Wellington. On ap-  
proaching Wellington we met our old  
friend Mr. W. L. Cotton of THE EXAMINER.  
He was raticating for a day or  
two and we were glad to find him looking  
 hale and hearty. After parting with Mr.  
Cotton the lowering clouds gave promise  
that one of our summer showers was near  
at hand, but as we neared Mount Pleasant  
a rift in the clouds revealed a clear sky  
and again all was sunshine. Here we part-  
ook of the hospitality of Mr. and Mrs.  
Philip Williams and if we take them as  
representative of other residents of the  
place, we may say the settlement has been  
happily named. Mount Pleasant has a fine  
school, and Mr. P. J. Williams is the  
teacher. He sends some of his pupils up  
for the entrance examination to Prince of  
Wales College every year, and as a general  
rule they "get there." Two of his pupils  
passed the recent examinations held in  
Summerside. Leaving Mount Pleasant  
we went on our way rejoicing and taking in  
the scenery of the country of which the  
lake at Portage forms a part. Passing  
through West Devon we reach Coleman  
where we remained until Saturday. Whilst  
here we called upon the genial pastor, Rev.  
A. J. McDougall, where we spent a pleas-  
ant hour. He is fast winning the hearts of  
the members of his congregation and is one  
of the most popular clergy of Prince Co.  
The tea held at Coleman on Saturday  
under the auspices of the I. O. F. was a  
splendid success, notwithstanding the rain  
in the morning. We had the pleasure  
there of hearing an address on Forestry,  
from Mr. H. A. Collins, of Ontario. He  
is a member of the supreme executive and  
occupies the responsible position of Sup-  
reme Treasurer. He is full of wit and  
humor and a very pleasing speaker. From  
the tea grounds we returned to Sum-  
merside, calling on our way at the residence of  
Mr. P. Williams, where, after partaking of  
a hearty supper prepared by our respected  
hostess Mrs. Williams we were entertain-  
ed with a symposium of music and song  
at which other tourists as well as our-  
selves were present. A very pleasant  
evening was thus spent; and we returned to  
Summerside well pleased with our trip to  
the west, agreeing with the poet who  
wrote:—

"When time that steals our years away  
Will steal our pleasures too,  
The memory of the past shall stay  
And half our joys renew."
