She will carry the freight lying there to Pictou, and after clearing up freight at Summerside she will, for the remainder of the season, ply between Pictou and Charlottetown.

After the usual loyal toasts had been drunk, "The day we celebrate" was proposed, and responded to, in a very pleasant speech, by Neil McLeod, Esq., Principal of the Davies School. Mr. McLellan responded to the toast of "Our Educational Institutions," and Mr. McKenzie, the champion tailor, as usual, made the speech of the evening. Finlay McNeill contributed extensively to the enjoyment of the evening by reading an original poem, suitable for the occasion. After spending a pleasant night, the party dispersed in the "waggon" hours, singing "Auld Lang Syne"—Mr. Angus McSween leading—while Mr. M. O'Donnell's Trial.

LONDON, Nov. 30. The trial of O'Donnell for the murder of James Carey commenced this morning before Judge George Denman, in the old Bailey Police Court. There were a great array of counsel present. O'Donnell was brought in cool after the court was opened, and seemed to be in very good health and quite unconcerned. The jury was sworn without any objections. Sir Henry James opened the case for the Government. O'Donnell listened closely to the address. Thomas Carey, son of James Carey, gave his evidence promptly and coolly, and it was about as previously reported in the papers. Mrs. Carey's evidence was also to the same effect as before reported. The prosecution closed and to-morrow the defence will be commenced.

Sad Suicide.

BALTIMORE, Md., Nov. 30. About noon to-day Mrs. Reall, aged twenty-eight, an American woman, cut the throats of her two children, aged four and two years, and then cut her own. The children died, but the mother is still living. The cause is domestic infelicity.

AND now we read of another successful Islander—as a candidate for the position of Sheriff, in Minnesota. This time we refer to Mr. Daniel McCormack (a brother of our own King's County Sheriff, Mr. Michael McCormack, who resides at Souris). Mr. Daniel McCormack left his Island home about fifteen years ago, and, according to The Rush City Post, has resided in Minnesota "upwards of twenty years." During the recent elections in the United States, the gentleman referred to was one of four candidates for the Shirevally of Minnesota, being in opposition to J. B. Drew (Rep.), B. F. Howard and Jacob Christensen (Indep.), Mr. McCormack being Democratic, and the victor in the contest by 227 of a majority, over the highest of the other three. In its issue of Nov. 2nd, only a short time before the election, the Post refers to our countryman in the following language:—"Mr. McCormack is an old citizen, having resided here upwards of twelve years, during nearly all of which he has been engaged in an important position by the St. P. & D. R'y Co. He is one of the noblemen of the country, well liked by everyone who knew him, and is well known by a large portion of the people of the country. He is an eminently well fitted to conduct the affairs of the office of Sheriff, and is well qualified in every respect, and if elected, will serve with credit to himself, and the people who elect him. We have nothing to say against his competitors, Mr. B. F. Howard, of North Branch, Mr. Jacob Christensen, of Fish Lake, or Mr. J. B. Drew, the Republican nominee of Harris, but anyone acquainted with these men can see at a glance that "our candidate" is head and shoulders above them all as to qualifications for the office."

The position just won by Mr. McCormack one of high importance, bringing along with it a good financial position, but the least important item. It is very pleasing to read the sentiments just expressed so publicly by a leading public journal of his adopted home, and all the more, when we know that he is in every way worthy of a good position. We heartily congratulate Mr. McCormack on his success.

A man about sixty years of age was found prowling around the corridors of the Fifth Avenue Hotel, New York, on the 27th ult. When told to leave by Detective Payor he walked to the stairway and shouted, "I am a colonel from Kentucky, and I made this trip East for the express purpose of shooting President Arthur." As he uttered the words he tapped the side pockets of his coat significantly. He then hurried out, called a cab, and was driven away. Fryer subsequently said that he firmly believed the stranger would have assassinated the President had he seen him. He did not appear to be a crank.

COLONEL WM. BENNETT, for many years the manager of the Cumberland coal mine at Maecan, died at Amherst, N. S., on the 28th ult. Deceased had been in delicate health for some time, but no alarm was felt on this account. This morning, while out for a short walk on the street, he fell in front of his residence and, being carried into the house, died in a few moments. Colonel Bennett was a native of the State of Maine, came to this province about twenty years ago and was, until the mine was sold to Senator McLouis and associates, the principal proprietor of the Cumberland mine. He was an enterprising, active honest citizen, and was highly esteemed by all classes. He was seventy-eight years of age.

The Halifax Sugar Refinery has closed down for the present, having used up its stock of raw. It was fortunate, says the Recorder, in the sale of most of its refined, as there has been a considerable fall in prices. It has now only about 2,000 barrels on hand. The time of its resumption is uncertain, entirely depending upon the arrival of vessels on the long passages that the sugar carries have.

ARCHBISHOP TACHE, on Friday, celebrated the 32d anniversary of his consecration. The venerable archbishop is now delivering a series of lectures on the Catholic missions of the Northwest territories.
