The sudden passing of Mrs. Peter F. Deagle, on April 25th, at Souris West, was indeed a great shock, particularly to the immediate members of her family, and also to the many friends who knew the pleasure of her acquaintance.

Death, like a thief in the night, came when it was least expected, for she was, apparently, in good health.
