

Islanders Score 4 - 0 Victory Over Sydney For First Shutout Of Season

Murph Chamberlain's improving Islanders moved back into a second place tie in the Maritime Major Hockey League last night by downing the Sydney Millionaires 4-0 in a well played game at the Forum. The Islanders and the Millionaires both have 16 points, three less than the league leading Halifax Atlantics.

The Islanders skated to victory over their Cape Breton rivals with a smooth passing attack that delighted the fair sized crowd of fans on hand. The game was cleanly played and featured some good body checking.

Goalie Bob Arneil picked up his first shutout of the season as he kicked aside 19 shots, several of them from close in. Arneil had several very hard shots in the third period and each time rose to the occasion.

Right winger Connie Bonhomme paced the Islanders attack with one goal and two assists. Line-mates Marcel Clements and Hub Beaudry each scored a goal while Ronnie Hurst accounted for the other Islanders marker on a play with Buck Whitlock.

Late Starting

The game was more than a half hour late in getting underway as the Sydney team was forced to make the longer cross-hatch at Wood Islands could not operate on account of the heavy sea. The Millionaires did not arrive in the City until 8:30.

The fans were well rewarded for their wait. In addition to the smart hockey Nick Pidsodny again gave a modified version of his special side-show. Nick turned in some good hockey as well. However, it wasn't Nick but Bob Arneil who stole the goaltender's spotlight.

For three minutes in the opening period there wasn't a shot on either net. Then just past the three minute mark Eddy Marinac let go a low slap shot from centre that Arneil turned aside without much trouble.

Hub Beaudry had the first good scoring opportunity when he attempted to poke home Bob Gray's rebound at the five minute mark but Pidsodny smothered the puck before Beaudry could connect. Gary Gordon rode in on Nick about a minute later and again the Sydney netminder held out the no admittance sign.

But Beaudry was back again at the 11:27 mark and this time he wasn't to be denied. Marcel Clements raced down the left hand side and carried to the corner before centering out a pass that Beaudry flipped into the twines from four feet out.

With Larry Travis sitting out a holding penalty Sydney swarmed to the attack around the fifteen minute mark. Using their first string forward line with Dunc MacIntyre and MacDonagh on defense they stormed around Arneil's citadel for about a minute but could not find an opening.

Hurst's First Goal

Ronnie Hurst's first goal as an Islander was the result of a beautiful play by centerman Buck Whitlock. The Islanders were attacking in the Sydney end when the Millionaires cleared the puck to centre ice.

Whitlock skated back for the puck and led a rush across the

blueline. He swerved to his left in side stepping two defenders before drifting a goal mouth pass to Hurst. Ronnie calmly deflected it behind Nick.

Two minutes later Connie Bonhomme scored a picture goal. From a face-off Beaudry fed a pass to Bonhomme along the right wing. Connie picked up the right wing around Weaver and raced into the clear. His shot along the ice on the short side was in the net before Pidsodny could move.

The third period was less than a minute old when Bruce Gallagher had a breakthrough on Arneil. Gallagher raced down the centre only to have Arneil beat him on his back hand shot from close in.

Seconds later Pidsodny pulled off another great save on Bellingier after the latter had been sent into the clear by Whitlock.

Then at the 9:13 mark the Islanders clicked for their last goal with both teams a man short. Bonhomme and Clements broke out of the Islanders end with only one man to beat. Connie errred the puck over to the blueline, and passed to Clements who beat Pidsodny with a close in drive. George McLagan, who sarked the play, was given an assist.

Seconds before he scored Clements had been beaten at the goal mouth by Pidsodny. Shortly after the goal Clements came close again but his deflection of Larry Travis' shot bounced across the open net.

Some Anxious Moments

Arneil had some anxious moments shortly afterwards as Sydney attempted to break his goose-egg. On one occasion Gallagher back handed one that slipped past the outside of the goal post. Dunc MacIntyre also raced in close but Bob turned back his golf shot.

In the last few minutes Arneil held the spotlight as he strove to keep his shutout. The Millionaires made several good sorties into the Islanders' end but they got few dangerous shots away.

The Sudbury Line of Beaudry, Bonhomme and Clements stood out for the Islanders on the attack while the whole defence corps turned in a very sound performance. Buck Whitlock and Hub Beaudry shared centre ice duties between them.

For the Millionaires George Robertson was again a standout up front and Dunc MacIntyre turned in a good performance on the blueline.

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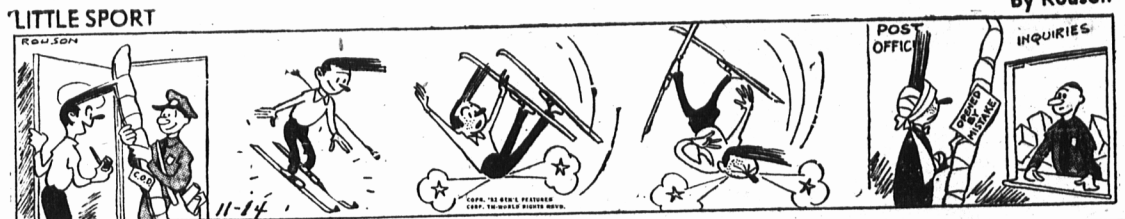
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For two nights now the Islanders have been flashing smart passing attacks with the result that they have racked up two impressive wins over their bitterest rivals and have treated the fans to some of the best hockey to be seen here for quite a while. Last night the Islanders showed some of the best hockey they have ever produced. In the second period especially they were throwing the puck around with the deftness and sureness that was the earmark of the Saint John Beavers last season.

Despite the sharp passing the most heart-warming feature of the game was the shutout racked up by Bob Arneil. Bob's job is being threatened by Al Millar of the Quebec Aces. Millar left Quebec last night and will meet the Islanders in Cape Breton during the next day or two. Those who have seen Millar rate him ahead of Ray Frederick who stopped for the Islanders last year. And he will have to be good to beat out Arneil for the regular goaltending berth.

Connie Bonhomme rates part of his success this season to the fact that he is wearing Willie Marshall's skates. Connie wore them for the first time Tuesday night and he picked up three points. Last night he picked up three more. The skates of course are not the real answer. Connie has been flying late and showing the form that won him an All Star berth in the Cape Breton League two years ago. His goal last night was a beautiful piece of work as he cut around the Sydney defense and beat Pidsodny all the way.

Things have come to a strange pass for the Islanders when Larry Travis becomes the bad man on the defense. But last night that's what happened. Larry drew three minor penalties while the rest of his defense mates escaped without serving any infractions in the penalty box. So far their clean playing has been paying good dividends. In the last two games opposing forwards have hardly ever gotten around the defense for a clear shot on net. In fact there have only been 29 shots on goal in the last two games which is about as good a recommendation for any defense as can be found. We heartily approve of Chamberlain's switching Bob Gray back to defense. Bob was an All-Star defenseman in Cape Breton two years ago and just watch out that he doesn't win All Star honors again before this season is out.

The Millionaires last played without the services of Don "Whip" Whelan. Whip is sick with the flu and was left home in Sydney. The Moneyman had a tough time before they reached here yesterday. They left home at six in the morning and were forced to come around by Borden when the Wood Islands-Caribou ferry did not cross. They only arrived here at 8:30 and this didn't give them much time to supple out before the start of the game.

It must be said that the Millionaires this year, in sharp contrast with last, produce a fighting type of game every time they come to the Forum. Cliff Roach has a number of outstanding hockey players in his lineup and he has some others who make up in fight what they lack in ability. The result is that they are always in there fighting until the last whistle and always dangerous.

The Millionaires and Islanders will travel to Sydney for a return game in the steel City tonight. This will be a battle for second place and the team that wins will be only one point behind the

Maple Leafs Take Over Top Spot In Standings With 3-1 Win Over Canadiens

MONTREAL, Nov. 13 (CP)—Toronto Maple Leafs roared into sole possession of first place in the National Hockey League for the first time this season by defeating Montreal Canadiens 3-1 tonight before a crowd of 14,495.

Canadiens, who held first place before tonight's game, contributed to their own downfall by loose defense bogged down time and again under the persistent checking of the Leafs.

All the scoring came in the second period. Harry Watson scored for the Leafs after only 17 seconds, deflecting in Jimmy Thomson's shot. Canadiens' lone goal, 40 seconds later, came on a hard backhand shot by Bert Olmstead on Doug Harvey's pass.

Harvey's slow attempt to clear on Ron Stewart's passout gave Ted Kennedy a chance and the Leaf captain didn't miss.

Kennedy was credited with an assist on the final goal when Stewart calmly poked in the puck from a scramble before anyone could clear.

The Leafs nursed the two-goal

lead carefully in the third period, taking only few chances relentlessly back-checking to halt Canadiens' power plays.

Leo Bolvin and Jimmy Thomas of the Leafs and Paul Meger of Canadiens suffered cuts in the rugged game. Bolvin had five stitches taken in a cut on his head and Meger one stitch in his hip. Thomson was cut inside the thigh.

Shantz Wins A.L. Most Valuable Player Award

NEW YORK, Nov. 13 (AP)—Bobby Shantz, the Philadelphia Athletics' pint-sized pitching marvel, today won the American League most valuable player award by a landslide vote.

The talented little lefty, who led the league with a 24-7 win-and-loss record, received 16 first-place votes from the 24-man committee of the Baseball Writers' Association.

Allie Reynolds, New York Yankee pitching ace, polled four firsts and Mickey Mantle, his sensational outfield mate, drew three to finish second and third.

The only other first place ballot went to Nelson Fox, Chicago second baseman, who finished seventh in the point totals.

On the basis of 14 points for a first-place vote, nine for second and so on down to one for 10th, Shantz totalled 280 points. Reynolds had 183 and Mantle 143, followed by Yankee Yogi Berra with 104.

Cleveland spotted four men in the first 10, including pitcher early Wynn (23-12), Bob Lemon (22-11) and Mike Garcia (22-11). Wynn was fifth, Lemon eighth and Garcia ninth. Al Rosen, third baseman with 28 homers and 105 runs batted in, rounded out the Cleveland contingent in 10th place.

Ferris Fain, Athletics' first baseman and batting champ for the second successive year, finished sixth.
