Employment Situation In Ch'town Area Reviewed

The Charlottetown National Employment Office reports some increase over the number of unemployed people as compared to the same period one year ago. Some of the unemployed have returned to the Island for the summer from Ontario and in some cases it is not clear whether they have come home for a prolonged vacation, or because they were unable to procure work. A few men have returned from Labrador where they have been employed since early Spring.

There has been a drop in the amount of construction work being carried out and a few semi-skilled carpenters, and one or two fully qualified carpenters are unemployed. Considerable work is being carried out in the National Park on new roads, and on the bridge which link-up Stanhope and Brackley Point by a much shorter route.

The Provincial Government is doing road maintenance work and reconstructing highways in various parts of the Province and this is giving employment to many men. The Dominion Government too is employing crews of men on various wharves and dredging projects at a number of ports and harbours. Considerable work is being done on the new Hillsboro Bridge in employing a number of men and machines, and it is understood this work will continue until winter calls a halt.

DRAGGERS ACTIVE
The draggers have been active at Souris throughout the summer and have had a fair year up to the present. Mackerel have been running well at Rustico within recent days, but there has been a drop in the price on the American market where many of the mackerel were being sold, especially in Boston. Mackerel were just beginning to put in an appearance in the Souris area last week.

Most retail merchants in Charlottetown have not had as good a year as was expected. Some merchants believe that many

thousands of dollars have been spent on TV sets and this has left little money for the purchase of other goods. Farmers have been obtaining a good price for pork but only a fair price for beef, and the potato growers are not quite certain how the market will be this autumn. None of the firms are willing to predict whether the potato market will be good or bad. Those in touch with the situation will not commit themselves until something more definite is known about the potato production both in Canada and United States.

PULPWOOD
Pulpwood is being cut in many

parts of the Province, and although the price is not all that could be expected, this type of work is giving employment to quite a number of men. Rural electrification is proceeding steadily, and the extension of power lines is also employing a number of workers.

The general employment situation according to the Charlottetown Office is fairly good. The Charlottetown National Employment Office speaks only of Kings and Queens Counties which is the area it serves. The Summer-side National Employment Office issues its own report on conditions in Prince County.

False U. S. Bills Pass

MONTREAL (CP)—The RCMP sought co-operation of the public in halting operations of a counterfeit ring that has been passing bogus \$20 and \$10 United States bills in Albany, N.Y., Sherbrooke, Que., and Montreal.

The \$10 and some of the \$20 denominations carry B series designation. Others of the \$20 denomination are G series.

Superintendent Edward Brakfield-Moore of the RCMP said Saturday it is too early yet to say whether connected rings are operating in the three areas. Three persons have been arrested in the United States in connection with the bogus G series and nearly \$9,500 of the counterfeit money found.

A \$20 G series bill turned up in a Montreal theatre two weeks ago, and several B series bills have been reported found here. Three bills of the same series were discovered in Sherbrooke.

Three young Rotarians successfully ran the gauntlet of criticism as they made maiden speeches before the older members of the club at the weekly dinner meeting held at the Charlottetown Hotel yesterday. Each in turn spoke on his "Classification" which qualified him for membership.

Hughie Simpson, Brian Cudmore and Donnie Martin, each speaking briefly, made it clear that they were competent to represent their type of business in the overall set-up of Rotary. They were introduced by chairman Fulton Pierce and heartily congratulated by the co-chair-

man, Jim Montgomery.

Cases Heard By Magistrate

A fine of \$15 and costs was levied in Queens County Magistrate's court yesterday morning by Magistrate Gilbert A. Evidence was completed in the case of a city resident charged with care and control of a motor vehicle whilst intoxicated. This case was adjourned to Friday, September 20th, for further argument.

Other cases disposed of during this session of the Court, included three speeders who were each fined \$10 and costs or ten days; a party charged with driving without a license was fined \$5 and costs or five days; and another party charged with permitting an unlicensed party to drive was fined \$10 and costs or ten days.
