prelates of the Russian Orthodox church, as everyone knows, lost their lives during and after the revolution. Thousands of others were sent to prison, or to exile. There were churches, everywhere. There still are. This does not mean they are operating today.

Some have been converted into living quarters, some into movie houses and some into grain storage places, or buildings connected with tractor stations.

In Moscow not far from the two apartments which I occupied—one
