## Navy League President To Inspect Sea Cadets

Currently on a tour of the Maritime sea cadet districts, Dr. H.D. Roberts of St. John's, Newfoundland, national president of the Navy League of Canada, sponsor of the cadet movement across the country, will be in Charlotte town today.

A highlight of his visit will be an address to members of the Prince Edward Island Division of the Navy League at the banquet which is being held at the Charlotte town Legion Home.

Chairman for this function and for the preceding reception will be Lt. Cdr. W.N. Black, RCNR (Ret), president of the Island Division, who will be assisted by the Island secretary-treasurer Ralph Carr.

Immediately after the banquet, the scene will shift to the former HMCS Queen Charlotte, where Dr. Roberts will carry out an inspection of the two city corps, RCSCC Kent and NLCC Hyndman.

During the inspection program he will also present first aid certificates to 25 Navy League Cadets, who recently successfully completed a 12-week course under Norman MacLeod, Red Cross First Aid instructor.

Dr. Roberts accompanied by Mrs. Roberts arrives in the city about 7.30 this morning, and during the forenoon will make official calls upon Lieutenant-Governor W.J. MacDonald, Premier Walter R. Shaw and Mayor A. Walther Gaudet.

For luncheon, accompanied by Mr. Black and Allison MacLeod, Dr. Roberts will be the guest of Rotary at their weekly meeting in the Charlottetown Hotel.

Following luncheon there will be a tour of the Fathers of Confederation Memorial Centre under the guidance of Lieut. D. Ross, RCNR (Ret).

The remainder of the afternoon will be taken up with a business meeting at the Experimental Farm. Also after the conclusion of the inspection and other business session will be

held at The Armouries followed by a friendly get-together.

Dr. Roberts was born in St. John's, and took his higher education at Prince of Wales College, Charlottetown, and Dalhousie University from where he graduated in medicine in 1936. Following graduation he took post-graduate work in both Canada and the U.S.

Returning to St. John's, with a number of other doctors he organized the Roberts Medical Group of which he is the head. At one time he served as a member and chairman of the PWC Board.

His other interests consist of, chairman of Elizabeth Drugs Ltd., which operates a chain of drug stores in St. John's. He also owns and operates two motels in the area and is president of Newfoundland Building, Savings and Investments Ltd.

Following Newfoundland becoming Canada's tenth province Dr. Roberts promoted the Navy League movement in that province.
