NEWS OF THE HORSES FROM ALL SOURCES

THE MOST REMARKABLE performance of the season at the Readville track was the mile in 2:19 1/2 trotted by the 2-year-old colt Blue Hill, by Blagen, 2:06. Out of Nelly McGeeger, 2:14. In his work-out last week the youngster trotted two miles in 2:24, and last Tuesday Henry Titer stepped him two miles in 2:22 1/2 and 2:19 1/2, with the last half of the last mile in 1:08.

As an individual, Blue Hill is faultless, a stoutly made chap, without the least bit of grossness. The colt's performance was the more remarkable from the fact that he was hardly broken when he was sent to Henry Titer this spring. It is doubtful if any 2-year-old ever trotted in 2:20 with as little work at this chap has had. When he first went to the track he displayed a decided inclination to have his own way, but now he appears to have made up his mind to attend to business, and has not made a break in his last three workouts.

With the exception of a colt which is credited with a trial in 2:17 1/2 at Lexington, Blue Hill is the first colt of the year to beat 2:20. Of course, the Kentucky colt has had a great deal better chance than Blue Hill, and, besides, was trained all season.

Blue Hill is owned by John M. Hall, formerly superintendent of Forbes farm and now in charge of Home farm, Milton the new home of Blagen, 2:04.

THE OLDEST HORSE in America, if not in the world, is skittishly prancing about the pastures in the vicinity of Boltonville, Wis., carrying his 37 years as lightly as though he were a young horse of eight summers.

It has already lived 17 years longer than the average lifetime allotted to a horse and is as lively and as full of the enjoyment of existence as though it never meant to die.

Billy is considered a celebrity in that community and is presented to strangers with as much ceremony as though he were the oldest inhabitant.

Billy has lived 33 years with one master and has seen a good deal, and being a particularly intelligent horse, could give a very good interview, if he could talk.

He is the property of Michael Lambrecht, who secured him from the original owner, Joseph Smith of Farmington township, Wis., when the horse was four years old.

Billy shows his age in but one respect; gray hairs are beginning to appear and Billy is too honest to bother about dyeing his locks. Just as they speak about well-preserved old people, they say of Billy: His eyesight is good and his teeth are holding out fine. He never had any dentist work done in his life, but better than that, he never was sick a day and never took a dose of medicine.

Billy does not believe in ending a well-spent life in idleness and is ready to serve the family on a nine or ten-mile jaunt any day.

Billy is full of tricks. He has been known to walk lame to try to get out of going on a trip, when he was disinclined, but when Mr. Lambrecht says to him: "Pshaw, Billy it's no use; you've got to go," he steps off lively.

WHEN DID ASCOT races begin? They are mentioned in the first "Racing Calendar," published in 1277, and the usual statement is that they were founded by the Duke of Cumberland, uncle of George III. But an entry in the accounts of the Master of the Horse in 1712 suggests that they were founded by Queen Anne on Aug. 6, 1711. The truth, no doubt, is that Ascot races, like many other august institutions, gradually developed from a germ, so that it is difficult to say when they really began. At any rate, they were quite the sort of thing that enthusiasts of the turf Queen Anne would have founded. She was through Stuart in this passion. It was her great-grandfather, James I., who encouraged, if he did not establish, horse racing in Scotland, and popularized it in England.

HON. J. M. JOHNSON, of Galois, announces the arrival of a beautiful large bay filly out of Nancy Haaks, 2:04, by John A. McKerron 2:04. This makes Mr. Johnson the possessor of the fastest bred colt the world has ever produced. Will she trot?

C. K. G. BILLINGS has purchased for \$10,500 the pacing stallion Blacklock, about which there has been so much talk of late. It was named Blacklock, whose record was 2:07; he paced the track at Davenport, Ia., in 2:01 1/2 and that at several people to looking him up. Then the horse was sent to Deatur, Ill., and the other day he paced a mile there in 2:03, the last half in .59. This news reached Cleveland and two men started to buy Blacklock. One was M. E. Sturgis, who formerly owned Dan Patch, and the other was Mr. Billings, who had the pacer under consideration for some time. Mr. Billings sent Murray Howe and a veterinary surgeon to Deatur. They examined the horse and found him usefully sound. They also learned the stories of his speed were true, and it did not take Howe long to buy the horse.

GAY BINGEN, Massachusetts bred youngster, disposed of the field at the Cleveland races, by winning without being extended to his limit, and trotted the opening heat in 2:12, the fastest mile ever covered by one of his age in a race this early in the season.

Quite a few horsemen figure that Gay Bingen can negotiate a mile at the present time in 2:10.

The winner is a brown colt with plenty of substance and while he cannot be called a handsome youngster has an average of good looks and stands fifteen hands and one inch high. He was bred by Fred L. Lee, of West Springfield, Mass., and was sired by Bingen, 2:04, and his dam is Galey Girl by Red Wilkes. James Brady, who drove him in his race to-day, developed Gay Bingen and has given him all of his work except a few weeks in his two-year-old form when Dave McClary schooled him. Gay Bingen in his yearling form showed Mr. Brady enough speed to warrant him in believing him a fast colt, and as a two-year-old with first end work he trotted a mile in 2:35.
