AN EXPENSIVE NEW JOY EXHILARATION IN THE PIPE AND AFTER COMES COMMISERATION.

The Indian Drug to be Mixed With Tobacco—First Effects Described as Dream-Producing Past Imagination—Headache Which Follows is Past Imagination.

Hasheesh is fast taking the place of opium among smokers who aspire to the richest misery and the highest pleasure which can come from inhaling blue fumes from a long stemmed pipe.

"An ounce of hasheesh costs a dollar," said a young man who knows. "It comes such, but it's great. I have a smoke every morning in the morning, and I wake up with a little of the most delicious and such dreams!"

Hasheesh is an Indian drug. It is obtained by making an infusion of the plant (Cannabis indica) in hot water, to which butter or oil is added. The resin attaches itself to the melted butter or oil, and when evaporated, is kneaded with flour and spices into pasties or cakes called "ganja."

Simple infusions of the leaves and flowering tops are drunk in many parts of India by old and young alike, at their festivity, but as alcoholic drinks are used too frequently in this country.

Just as the hasheesh which is sold in New York, compared to that which is drunk on public occasions in its native haunts, is as far from being a mild and harmless as a little of the imported article goes a long way. It is made up into a fine powder and resembles snuff. Two pinches of it will furnish a man with enough dreams to last him for a week.

It is nearly always used in combination with tobacco, although some of its devotees take it "straight," a fact which excites the envy and wonder of other hasheesh smokers. The hasheesh and tobacco are kneaded together in the palm of the one hand. When they are thoroughly mixed, the combination is scooped into the bowl of the pipe.

Some smokers sprinkle a little of the Indian drug upon their tobacco every time they smoke, and in this way they get satisfaction without the trouble.

"The first effect of hasheesh," said a hasheesh smoker, "is of great exhilaration. You feel as if you were walking upon the clouds of the world. The hand which holds a pipe of ganja, is steady to which the great opera bollet is tawdry indeed, are at the bidding. You feel you want to talk, to talk you do. Your tongue seems to go with the ease and rapidity of a hummingbird's wings."

"You thought you had dreams before, but, oh no! You had not. It is now that you see such scenes as the brush of the painter or the pen of the writer cannot describe. You see things in made of diamonds reflected in water of glass and so on. Then you fall asleep."

Mnemonics. Mnemonics, or the art of rendering artificial aid to the memory by associating in the mind things difficult to remember, with those which are easy of recollection, is of very ancient origin. It is said to have originated with the Egyptians, but the first person to reduce it to a system was, according to Cicero, the poet Simonides, who lived 500 years B.C. His plan is known as the topical, or locality plan, and was in substance as follows: Choose a large house, with a number of differently situated apartments. In the upper portion of the mind carefully all that is noticeable in the house, so that the mind can readily go over all its parts. Then place a series of words, or things, in the hall, in the next in the sitting room, and so on with the rest. Now when one wishes to recall these ideas in their proper succession, commence going through the house, and the idea placed in each department will be found to readily recur to the mind in connection with it. It is related that the mnemonic poet, Pindar, suggested to the poet by a tragic occurrence. Having been called from a banquet just before the roof of the house fell and crushed all the rest of the company, he was enabled to remember that the bodies were so unimpaired that no individual could be recognized, but by remembering the places which they had occupied, he was able to identify them. He was led to notice that the order of places may by association suggest the order of things.—Fittsburg Dispatch.

NEW BRUNSWICK Honored Distinctions in the Provincial Government—Extract From Official Report in the House of Assembly.

(Official Report.) Fredericton, March 20.—Dr. Stockton said that as Hon. Mr. Mitchell had referred to rumored resignations, he (Stockton) would ask if there was any truth in the rumor that Hon. Messrs. Tweedie and White had resigned.

Hon. Mr. Blair assured his friends opposite that their expectations regarding the vacancies would have to remain unrealized for the present at least. (Laughter.) He would tell them with all candor that no vacancies existed for their acceptance. (Laughter.)

Hon. Mr. Tweedie said he had nothing to add to the statement made by the Attorney General. He wished, however, to read the following letter, which he had received, and which, to some extent, explained the anxiety of some honorable gentlemen opposite:
