Black Hawks Win 3-2 From Leafs

ST. LOUIS, (AP)—Chicago Black Hawks staged off a last period rally by Toronto Sunday night to beat the Maple Leafs 3-2 in a National Hockey League game before 5,174 fans.

Goalie Al Rollins came up with 14 saves in the final period as the Hawks chalked up their first victory in three transplanted "home" games at the arena this season.

Chicago outplayed Toronto through the first half of the first period as the Leafs concentrated on a stout defense. After Jerry Toppazzini had missed a tip-in on a shot that hit the pipe at the side of the net, Jack McInyre scored on the same sort of deflection shot for the Hawks.

The Leafs took advantage of a penalty to tie the score as Ted Kennedy and George Armstrong worked out a line pass play to set up a shot from the penalty line for Ted Sione at 16:37.

Chicago counted twice in the second period as Eddie Lutzenberger picked up a rebound and shot it into the net at 15:28 and Toppazzini grabbed a rebound off the boards and relayed it to Nick Mickoski for the score at 16:58.

Bob Bailey of Leafs, scored the only goal of the third period.

The tie left the Rangers in fifth place with 29 points, a point behind the Bruins.

The Bruins took the ice minus their captain and star forward Ed Sandford, who suffered an injury to his knee ligaments in Saturday's game against the Rangers. He will be out of action for 10 days.

Four minutes later, Boston went further ahead when Chevrefils skated in alone to score.

But New York fought back and Ron Murphy reduced the deficit at 10:50. Gadsby netted the equalizer on an assist from Andy Bathgate three minutes later.
