CHICAGO (CP)—Chicago Black Hawks increased their hold on first place in the National Hockey League lead to three points Sunday night with a hard-fought 5-3 victory over Toronto Maple Leafs.

SKATES LENGTH OF ICE Doug Mohs seemed to get the Hawks out of trouble midway in the middle period when he skated the length of the ice to beat Toronto goalie Terry Sawchuk from 15 feet out and give the Hawks a 4-3 lead. 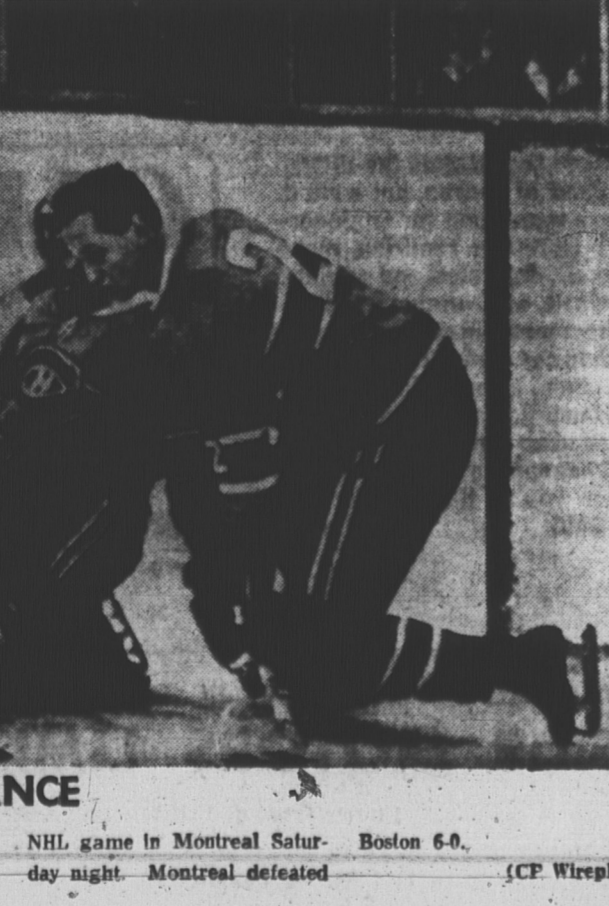
