STAGE SET FOR ANNUAL ALL-STAR GAME

Smashes Own Mark By Driving Car Over Salt Flats At 162.599 Miles An Hour

TWO MARITIME TRACK MARKS SHATTERED

Roy Oliver Is Outstanding Athlete At Maritime Olympic Trials.

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) SAINT JOHN, N.B., July 6.—Two Maritime records toppled and several others were threatened here this evening at the Maritime Olympic Track and Field Trials, considered also as the Maritime track and field championships.

Roy Oliver, well known long distance runner from New Glasgow, N.S., and member of a famous Canadian team in the British Empire Games, emerged as a star among the 80 athletes who took part in the 16 events.

Oliver had things his own way in the 5,000 metres run, setting a new record of 15 minutes 53 and 3-5 seconds. This broke the mark of 17 minutes 15-5 established in 1930 by H. Gough, Trenton, N.S. Oliver also led all the way in the 10,000 metres race and was closely followed by his running mate from New Glasgow, Bernie Rogers.

A six-years-old javelin throw record was shattered by G. A. Walters, Lunenburg, N.S., when he made a heave of 187 feet 5 1/2 inches. The former record was held by Leslie Tompkins, Antigonish, N.S., at 147 feet.

Another new record was missed by only one-fifth of a second when Ross Blanch, flash from Amherst, N.S., swept through a semi-final heat of the 100 metres dash in 11-1-5 seconds. He won the final.

The Highland Society of Antigonish, N.B., was again the leading point winners. Norman MacRitchie, young and husky, captured both the shot put and discus throw. He also was second to Walters in the javelin throw, and Dr. Hyman Magone, Cape Breton, won the high jump.

Tompkins, Antigonish, scored five feet 11 1/2 inches.

Due to lack of seasoning, the month old track at the New K-Club Grounds was slow.

The trials were originally scheduled for last Saturday, but were forced a postponement until this evening, when fine weather favored the meet.

BONNEVILLE SALT FLATS, Utah, July 6.—Captain George Eyston, leading another Utah charge on motor-car speed and endurance marks, smashed one of his own today as his low-slung racer covered 162,599 miles in one hour.

The old record was 151,302 miles. The tanned, tight-lipped Briton set it a year ago on this same glittering white expanse of salt 110 miles west of Salt Lake City.

Tomorrow, weather permitting, Eyston will roll his 12-cylinder, shark-nosed "Speed of the Winds" again for an attack on other marks—perhaps his 24 hour endurance record of 140.5 miles an hour.

It was on this course, laid out on the bed of an ancient saline sea, that Eyston's countryman, Sir Malcolm Campbell, last year drove his famed "Bluebird" to a world record of 301 miles an hour over a measured mile.

The Captain drove over a 10-mile circular track Campbell's great time was made along a straight line.

"Everything functioned perfectly," the sober-visaged Eyston said as he crawled from behind the high shield of his specially built car (Rolls Royce). "It was a difficult undertaking to make the run on the 10-mile circuit inasmuch as the longer track is 60 per cent on the mechanism of the car. But I was still able to maintain a maximum speed of 170 miles an hour."

His mention of a longer track referred to a 12 mile course which has been spotted by frequent rains and still could not be used.

Eyston was forced to try twice. On the first dash, a front wheel was out of line, causing the tire to rub. He headed for the track side pit after 30 minutes during which he estimated he maintained an average of about 170 miles an hour.

There was no hitch as he started again after repairs had been made.

JUST MISSES HURLING NO-HITTER

Flashing the brand of ball that has kept them at the top of the league most of the season Tip Tops last night smothered the Anchors 17 to 1 in a scheduled game of the Industrial League. 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Can. Olympic Trials To Start Today At Montreal; 500 Likely To Take Part

MONTREAL, July 6.—The pre-Olympic show of Canadian athletes goes on in Montreal tomorrow with the first splash of water in Notre Dame de Grace pool and will hold the spotlight until two days before the Olympians sail for Berlin on the Duchess in Bedford July 17.

Swimmers and divers from all parts of the country open the big show tomorrow afternoon and keep it moving until Thursday. Track and field takes over Friday and finishes Saturday. Wrestling trials will be staged the last two days of the week and the boxers will start throwing punches Monday and finish Wednesday night.

Officials of the trials estimate about 500 athletes will take part in the competitions to determine the strength and personnel of the Canadian team. Scores of swimmers and track stars have been training here for several weeks. Others are arriving by every train.

BOSTON, July 6.—Baseball's dream game, nothing but a nightmare to the National League since it began three years ago, comes true again tomorrow with the diamond's stars clustered about to wage a dramatic thriller before an anticipated sell-out throng of 42,000 at Boston National League park.

Embarrassed and defeated in all three previous all-star encounters, the National League forces, headed by Charlie Grimm of the champions Chicago Cubs and fortified with several hustling freshmen, were in a belligerent mood as they awaited the call to battle at 2:30 p.m., A.D.T.

Out to Win
"It may not be fair to say we haven't tried our best to win these all-star games in the past," retorted confident manager Grimm, "but I am confident we're going to have something sweet to dream about after this dream game tomorrow night. This all-star game started out to be an exhibition but it's serious business now with all of us. We're out to win and we'll shoot the works all the way."

Joe McCarthy, pilot of the fast flying New York Yankees and manager of the American League all-stars, left the pre-battle statements to Grimm. Marse Joe sent word he didn't plan to arrive in Boston until tomorrow morning and that he wouldn't announce his lineup until almost game time.

S., July 6.—When Lloyd Bryanton returns to Halifax to compete in the Halifax Chronicle and Halifax Daily Star 25 mile bicycle race to be held on the evening of August 3, an old acquaintance of his will be on the same starting line, Albert Boutillier. Boutillier defeated Bryanton in his first appearance in Halifax. With the former Maritime champion racing with Bryanton and the present title holder, Maurice Hughes, a great race is expected.

Arrangements are being made to have New Brunswick represented in this year's classic of the bikes. With the three provinces intact the race will no doubt be an outstanding event during the Rodeo Week program.

It has been decided by the racing committee to offer a beautiful cup for team competition as well as the regular prizes.

Lloyd Bryanton, age 21, weight 133 pounds, won his first race in Charlottetown in 1932 when he captured the Holman-Pickard 10 mile, came to Halifax the following year to lose a tough race to Albert Boutillier, of Bedford. Bryanton rode in the 25 mile race in Halifax last year and a great number of the experts favoured him to capture the race, but a very disastrous evening accident prevented him to retire. If Bryanton returns this year to Halifax no doubt he will be well up with the leaders, providing Lady Luck behaves.

Maurice Hughes, age 18, weight 186, Hughes entered the race in Halifax last year as a dark horse. It was Hughes' second race, having finished fifth a year before in the Charlottetown 10 mile. While most of the outstanding Halifax riders were keeping tags on Bryanton, Hughes undoubtedly was stealing the whole show. Halifax will welcome Hughes back, to see him race against Albert Boutillier, Nova Scotia's best.

During my visit to the Island last year, I understood an outstanding bicycle expert hoped to have a team of four riders come to Halifax to race under Prince Edward Island. Harry Lewis and Bill Warren added to those already mentioned, a better team could not be named. Little can be said about Lewis and Warren around the racing area of Halifax and other points.
