

Summerside Aces Nip BYC

MacArthur Pots Three And Vance Harris Gets 2 More

Summerside Aces blew a 2-0 first period lead, but rebounded back to edge Basillea Youth Club 6-4 in a fast and rough Island Senior League game at the Sports Arena last night. The victory gave the Aces a 2-0 lead in the best-of-seven series for the Prince Edward Island Senior B Championship.

Led by sturdy defenceman Ron MacArthur, who fired three goals, Aces took a 2-0 lead in the first four minutes of play. The youth club got one of them back before the period ended and rolled into a 3-2 lead in the second. Aces tied it up again and B.Y.C. went one-up early in the third but the Aces rallied in three in a row in the last ten minutes of play to walk home with a victory.

Speedy Vance Harris contributed two of the Summerside goals and hard-working Leroy Chlow fired the goal that proved to be the winner at 16:31 of the final period.

READY NETS TWO
Playing coach Spy Ready sniped two of the youth club goals with singles going to Merrill Pineau and Johnny Squarebriggs.

Tempers, which were on edge from the opening minutes boiled over on several occasions during the rough and tumble game. Most serious outbreak of the night came in the third when a fan tangled with Ulric Gallant along the sideboards. Red Howatt managed to get them separated, but Eustace Reeves got away a left jab to the spectators jaw and earned himself a misconduct penalty. Feeling was running high at this point and referees Jack Kane and Don Whelan had to be on their toes to prevent a pier-sixer.

In the last minute of play Frank Shepherd and Gord Cutcliffe clashed and picked up majors and just as the siren sounded the end of the game. Johnny Squarebriggs and Coke Grady went at each other.

The Aces played a solid man game and B.Y.C. did not get many good scoring chances in the first period as a result of the close checking. Aces carried the play throughout the period and blinked the light twice while the youth club played scramble hockey in the early minutes. At 1:49 MacArthur started the ball rolling when Doyle fanned off his waist high drive from about 30 feet out.

At 3:35 Vance Harris got his first when he caught a corner with a sharp backhand. After that goal the youth club seemed to finally find their legs and played better positional and defensive hockey.

At 16:51 of the period coach Ready picked up Jack Burke's passout from the corner and fired a 25-footer that caught the upper corner.

TIE SCORE
The second period was only 40 seconds old when Merrill Pineau knotted the count and it was 3 minutes and 45 seconds older when Squarebriggs gave the youth club a 3-2 lead. Pineau battled in his goal after a wild scramble around the Summerside net and Lloyd Shepherd engineered a neat play to send Squarebriggs in on Mann for the 1-goal lead.

Aces needed only 1 minute and 7 seconds to knot the count, with Vance Harris triggering the goal after a passing bout with Ulric Gallant.

In the first minute of the third period Jack Burke had a clean cut breakaway on Thane Mann but the Aces agile netminder outguessed him when Burke chose to try and move in close.

Reeves picked up his misconduct penalty at 5:28 of the period and at 5:46 Ready shot the B.Y.C. into a 4-3 lead. Red Howatt came on another 25-footer from almost the identical spot he scored his first goal. This time however, Mann was beaten on a low drive to the short side.

Lloyd Shepherd was sitting out hooking penalty when MacArthur fired his second. Vance Harris started him off but the Aces ace

defenceman did most of the work himself beating Doyle with a low drive from fairly well out.

NETS WINNER
Chlow's winner came after a beautiful play by defenceman Frank Steele. Steele weaved his way almost the entire length of the ice, split the defence but had his shot stop blocked expertly by Doyle. However, Chlow was riding right behind Steele and lifted the rebound into the net.

Only 25 seconds later B.Y.C. was pressing when Coke Grady and MacArthur broke away with only one man back. Grady coasted right in and dropped a short pass back to MacArthur and Ron made no mistake. Doyle never saw the shot.

CHATTER..... That victory gave the Aces a real stranglehold on the title.....Another win on Thursday and it would be all but wrapped up.....Coke Grady, Eustace Reeves and MacArthur played standout hockey for Summerside. Johnny Squarebriggs and Lloyd Shepherd came through with steady games for the youth club.....The storm kept the crowd down to under a 1,000 but with any kind of help from the weatherman at all there should be about twice that many at Thursday's tussle.....Now the Aces are heavy favorites to take the League championship.....Maybe being the underdogs will turn the youth club into the team they were against Parkdale.

Montreal Defeats Boston, Beliveau Scores Winner

MONTREAL (CP) — Big Jean Beliveau, streaking into the clear on Boom-Boom Geoffrion's forward pass, scored the only goal at 2:27 of the second period Tuesday night, giving Montreal Canadiens a shutout over Boston Bruins and the second straight game in the Stanley Cup final.

The second setback in Montreal for the Bruins leaves them trailing 2-0 for the third game when the teams play in Boston garden.

Tuesday night's game was a vicious checking struggle, the Bruins battling in vain for the tying goal in the dying minutes while the crowd of 14,500 screamed throughout Canadiens' last great defensive stand that earned goalie Jacques Plante his shutout.

Beliveau's goal, which grew bigger and bigger as the minutes ticked off, seemed to catch the Bruins by surprise.

Defenceman Dollars St. Laurent of Montreal battled Red Chevrefils of Boston for the puck in the Montreal end. St. Laurent finally got it and sent a pass up over the blue line to Geoffrion, on the right side. Beliveau was streaking straight down centre. Geoffrion sent a pass that went between the Bruins defence of Joe Bolvin and Bob Armstrong, just as Beliveau raced between them.

The Montreal centre, ace scorer for his club this season, gathered in the puck without breaking stride and sped in on goalie Don Simmons, pulling the goalie out with some fancy stickhandling and lifting the puck into the net.

The Bruins kept a close watch on Maurice (Rocket) Richard, who counted four of his team's goals in their 5-1 Saturday night game. The Rocket this time was tailed by Fleming Mackell, with a switch in the Boston lines against Richard's trio, instead of Red Chevrefils.

The Rocket was balked in his scoring efforts, largely in the third period through the sensational work of Simmons.

The shutout of the Bruins was the first time in 69 games they have been blanked. They last were held scoreless Oct. 30 in Chicago, when the Black Hawks won 4-0.

The close checking throughout held down the shots on goal, particularly by Canadians, who had 23 compared with the 41 they rained at Simmons in the first

game. The Bruins had the range on Plante 24 times.
Both teams missed great chances in the opening period. Beliveau and Geoffrion came in on Simmons with a perfect passing combination only to have the goalie break it up at the last split second. Mackell blew a chance for the Bruins when he failed to get away Larry Regan's set-up pass, a few feet out from Plante.

After the one big opportunity, which Beliveau grabbed without a fluster, Canadians ran into precision forechecking that threw them off balance.

Each side absorbed penalties—six to Montreal and five to Boston—without faltering and meeting the shorthanded situation with dogged checking and solid bumping.

The longer the third period went the more savage the offensive by the Bruins. Canadians met it one of their own instead of falling back on the defensive to protect their slender lead.

Leo Labine missed on one chance midway in the period and scarcely a minute later Plante made the most sensational save of the night when he robbed Cal Gardner of a goal. The Boston centre split cleanly the Montreal defence of Tom Johnson and Jean Guy Talbot and raced in on Plante. The play was almost a duplication of that on which Beliveau scored.

Rocket Richard kept his mates fired up in the late minutes. With 40 seconds left, Simmons was taken from the Boston net in favor of an extra forward. The Bruins had two faceoffs in the Montreal end. Johnson battled for the puck, shot wide at the open net far away and the play was icing.

After the next faceoff, Jerry Toppazzini's shot was blocked with only five seconds left and the Bruins were still trying desperately at the final siren.

The Brooklyn battler was to have met Durrelle March 25 but he developed a sore elbow and arm while in training. Durrelle dropped last minute substitute Clarence Floye in the seventh after losing his first bout of the year to Clarence Hinant of Washington in Miami.

Durrelle and his manager will leave here Saturday or Monday for New York where the New Brunswick boxer will train for the bout which will also feature Norman Gautreau, a Moncton welterweight. Gautreau stopped Charlotetown's Gaston Roy in his last outing.

Thompson, a regular with the Giants since 1949, was sold outright to the club's Minneapolis farm in the American Association. Shortstop Eddie Bressoud and pitchers Jim Constable and Fernando Rodriguez went to Minneapolis on option.

When told of his release, Thompson, 31, threatened to quit baseball but reconsidered after a talk with manager Bill Rigney. He said he would report to the Minneapolis club on Saturday.
