COUNTY COURT.

The County Court, which opened in Charlottetown on Wednesday last, is still in session. The following are the chief suits tried during the week: Michael McLaughy vs. John D. McKinnon—Damages for non-fulfillment of contract in exchange of reapers, \$33.00. Judgment for plaintiff for \$21.45.

James Acorn vs. Patrick McDonald.—Promissory note, \$12. Judgment for that amount, and order on Patrick Stewart, guarantor, to pay same.

On the authority of a recent English decision Judge Alley held that non-payment of the price was part of the cause of an action, and as the debtor was bound to find out his creditor to pay the debt to him, in the absence of any special agreement to the contrary, his default in making payment to him in Charlottetown entitled the plaintiff to sue in this County, where the plaintiff resides. Judgment for plaintiff for amount claimed. This decision adds materially to the facilities afforded business men in this city for suing in the County Court here.

Malcolm McLean vs. Ronald J. McDonald.—Action for promissory note, \$16. Postponed till March term on application of defendant.

John Larkin vs. George Forbes.—Oats sold, \$75.43. Judgment for \$72.64. This action was contested on the ground that plaintiff had agreed to discharge a debt due by his father out of the price of the oats sold.
