SIR OLIVER TO BE GOVERNOR OF ONTARIO.

Davies or Mills—Which?

OTTAWA, Sept. 11.—Mr. Samuel Mutch has been appointed sub-collector of customs at Montague, King's County, P. E. Island.

W. J. Johnston, a clerk in the post office department, has been appointed accountant to fill the vacancy caused by the death, yesterday, of Mr. Barrett. The appointment of Capt. J. E. Curran of the Halifax district as paymaster has been gazetted, the appointment dating from July 1st.

All plans of Jubilee stamps have been destroyed.

Sir Oliver Mowat has definitely decided to take the Ontario Governorship, although the Premier was anxious for him to remain in the cabinet. Sir Oliver however is tired of some of the company he is compelled to keep around the council board. He will recommend Hon. David Mills as his successor although Sir Louis Davies thinks that he has the best claim to the Justice Department.

DISASTER AT DAWSON CITY.

Starvation in Sight.

Severe Winter Has Set in.

OTTER POINT, B. C., Sept. 11.—The steamer Cleveland has arrived here from St. Michael, bringing with her from the Yukon gold fields a story of distress and disaster.

The miners she has on board and the officers of the ship tell the story of the disaster at Dawson City. The winter has set in at the mining city of the frozen north, and the two great stores of the place have closed their doors for they have nothing to sell.

Those who have been seeking gold, must now seek for food or starve.

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL

WASHINGTON, September 9.—The annual report of the auditor for the interior department shows that the amount paid for pensions during the last year was \$140,477,637.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Sept. 9.—The latest intelligence from Labrador confirms the report of the complete failure of the cod fishery this season. The catch is very small and the low prices probably mean a severe winter for the fishermen.

LONDON, September 9.—The Daily Mail's correspondent at Cairo says it is rumored there that the advance of the Anglo-Egyptian column, under General Sir Herbert Kitchener, to Khartoum, will be delayed until January, owing to lack of funds. The troops meantime will be concentrated at Berber.

SANTA FE, N. M., Sept. 9.—Reports from Golden, South Santa Fe Co., say that in sinking a tubular well to secure a water supply, the drill passed through 50 feet of solid quartz. Some of the gold nuggets are as large as grains of wheat. The discovery was made on virgin ground at a depth of 350 feet.

COLON, Colombia, Sept. 9.—The authorities having decided to repatriate the African laborers recently imported to work along the line of the Panama canal, they will be sent back to Africa by the steamer Holyrood, which is momentarily expected. After the epidemic of beriberi broke out among them, they gave such serious trouble, they refusing to work, demanding wages without work and committing other offences, that the Government was obliged to send troops to quell the disturbances. Order is now restored.

ODESSA, September, 9.—The crisis in the grain trade in Southern Russia has been enhanced by the influx of a half score of Hungarian commissioners who are purchasing wheat at any price at which they can obtain it. A majority of the grain exporters are in a precarious position and a large number of smaller firms have collapsed. One large foreign export firm alone has lost three million roubles on the fulfillment of contracts made by it in the expectation that there would be a middling crop. With the exception of barley, all the cereals are as light as they are scant, while the fact that the Government has made extraordinary purchases of grain for food reserve as a precaution against another famine has increased the scare.

MONTREAL, September 6.—There were numerous incidents throughout the past week in connection with the Medical Convention which the daily papers did not mention, but which are, nevertheless, worth recording. At the big annual dinner of the British Medical Association at the Windsor the committee of management was considerably worried by the matter of arranging the guests at the head of the table. The matter of precedence was carefully considered, and what was thought a satisfactory arrangement came to. As a compliment to Sir T. Granger Stewart, of Edinburgh, the president elect, he was placed at the immediate right of the chairman, Dr. Roddick, while His Excellency the Governor-General was placed at the chairman's left side. The arrangement, however, did not suit Lord Aberdeen. He claimed, so it is stated by authorities, that the right hand of the chairman was the proper place for the representative of Her Majesty, and that is where he sat throughout the proceedings.

Violet Raymond, a variety actress, formerly of San Francisco and Seattle, is now a princess and rich at Dawson City. She married an Italian who found fortune. He is called Prince Antone. He made his bride a present of \$16,000. Miss Raymond and Miss Lamore went to Dawson City together. There is but one lady in the town who is not married! She has refused every single man in Dawson, and they knelt before her with uplifted hands full of gold. Being refused they have told her that she doesn't know a good thing when she sees it. She wears short skirts, carries an umbrella and wants to vote.
