# Yanks Shade Bosox 13-6; Tribe-Tigers Split Two

New York Yankees have turned back the first challenge of the youthful Boston Red Sox who came into Yankee Stadium with a perfect record and left Sunday night with three straight defeats. Jittery fielding hurt the Red Sox who fought back both Saturday and Sunday to overcome long Yankee leads only to blow the games in the late stages.

Despite a grand slam homer by pitcher Don Larsen of the Yanks in the third, Boston came back to tie the score at 6-6 in Sunday's game only to bow 13-6 when the Sox were guilty of five errors.

Mickey Mantle's two-run homer and Yogi Berra's two-run double put the crusher on reliever Frank

Baumann in the seventh. Three more Yankee runs scored in the eighth on only one hit—a single. Billy Pierce turned in a brilliant three-hitter to shut out Kansas City 3-0 and won a tight duel with Alex Kellner. It was Chicago's fourth victory in five games and a fast recovery from Saturday's crushing 15-1 defeat. Nellie Fox hit a home run in the eighth for the first run of the afternoon.

LEMON GOES DISTANCE

Bob Lemon finally went the

route for Cleveland for the first time since last May 30 to give Cleveland a second game edge over Detroit 5-2 and an even break for the day. Al Kaline hit two homers in Detroit's 6-4 victory in the opener.

Baltimore and Washington, picked to fight it out for the cellar in the American League, split a doubleheader at Baltimore.

Rookie Fred Basena, with relief help, managed his first major league win in the first game 7-3 but Cuban Camilo Pascual held the Orioles to four hits as Washington got even by taking the second 4-1.

Don Newcombe got on the beam with his first 1956 victory for Brooklyn, a rain-shortened 4-1 decision at Pittsburgh. Newk allowed only three hits in a game called on account of rain early in the seventh. At first, Pittsburgh announced it was protesting because the start was delayed 30 minutes when a drizzle was falling but later the protest was withdrawn.

PHILS, GIANTS SPLIT

Robin Roberts made it two in a row for the Phillies, beating Johnny Antonelli of New York Giants 3-1 in the first game. The Giants' lefty allowed only three hits but one was a homer by Ted Kazanski with two on in the second.

The Giants took the second 9-7 on a three-run homer by Willie Mays and a timely single by Daryl Spencer.

After St. Louis scored eight runs in the sixth inning to slug Milwaukee 10-4 the Braves came back to club the Cardinals 13-5.

Stan Musial started the big inning for St. Louis with a single and later cleared the bases with a grand slam homer. Hank Aaron and Del Rice homered among Milwaukee's 16 hits in the second game.

Chicago included home runs by Ernie Banks, Monte Irvin and Solly Drake among their four hits in a 5-4 edge over Cincinnati in the first game. The second finished in a 1-1 tie, called at the end of the seventh on account of darkness at Wrigley Field. The Cubs had the second game in the bag with a 1-0 lead in the seventh when pitcher Bob Rush walked Ray Jablonski with the bases full.

Chicago had only two hits in the second game, both by Hobie Landrih, former Cincinnati catcher.

The Nova Scotia junior league winner will advance to the eastern Canada junior finals, meeting the winner of the Quebec-Ontario playoff at Montreal Nov. 3.

The MFU intermediate final will also be held on Nov. 3 at a site to be named at a later meeting. It was suggested that a New Brunswick centre be picked for the Maritime playoff.

# Habs Shade Marlies 3-2

TORONTO (CP)—The Junior Montreal Canadiens staved off a desperate Toronto Mariboro attack Sunday and won 3-2 to prolong the eastern Canada Memorial Cup final.

Canadiens took a 3-0 lead in the second period and appeared headed for an easy victory but Mariboros fought back with two goals before the period ended.

A crowd of 9,952 fans watched Toronto bombard the Montreal net

in the final 20 minutes but Mariboros couldn't get the puck behind goaltender Ed Johnston.

The win was Canadiens' second in the best-of-seven final, which Mariboros lead three games to two, with one tie. The seventh game will be played tonight at Montreal. The winner meets Regina Pats in the Canadian junior final.

Michel Legace, Claude Ruel and Ralph Backstrom scored the Canadiens' goals with Ken Girard and Al MacNeil firing goals for Toronto.

Johnston was sensational in the final period as Mariboros tried doggedly to tie the game. A dead-

lock would have given them the series. The tall Montreal netminder kicked out 13 shots in the last stanza. He kicked aside a total of 30 shots. Bob senior, substitute goaltender for Mariboros, stopped 27 drives.

## Winnipeg Wins Game And Ch'ship

Winnipeg (CP)—A five-goal second-period outburst gave Winnipeg Warriors a 6-3 victory over Vancouver Canucks Saturday night and the best-of-seven Western Hockey League championship by four games to two.

Warriors now will meet Montreal Royals, Quebec League champion for the Edinburgh Trophy. The best-of-nine series will be played in the West, with the first game at Edmonton April 27, the second at Calgary April 28 and the next three at Winnipeg April 30, May 1 and 3. The Winnipeg arena is not available for the opening games.

A crowd of 9,854 saw left winger Eddie Mazur pace the Winnipeg attack Saturday night with two goals. Billy Mosienko, Gary Altcorn, Chuck Lumsden and Mike Nykoluk scored one each.

Ray Cyr, Phil Maloney and Tom McCarthy scored for Vancouver.

Vancouver took a 2-0 lead in the first period but fell back when Warriors counted four goals in less than four minutes, then added another about eight minutes later before Canucks counted again. Winnipeg tallied the only goal of the final session.

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
