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8 Testify At Alberton Inquest; Verdict Open

A coroner's jury empaneled by Dr. C. M. Dewar heard evidence from eight witnesses in Alberton court house last night and brought in a verdict that Martin Joseph McIntyre died as the result of injuries received when a GMC half-ton truck driven by Robert Wells, 33 which he was a passenger, ran out of control at the Gillian Bridge, South Kidare, on

Sept. 6, 1963 between 4 and 4:30 p.m.

The first witness, Dr. Andreas Aquino, assistant provincial pathologist, said he conducted a post-mortem on the body of McIntyre and gave the immediate cause of death as extensive skull fractures with haemorrhage and subsequent brain damage. A blood analysis indicated some degree of intoxication.

Eviola Cahill, school teacher, South Kidare, said she was driving over the Gillian Bridge toward her home when she saw a half-ton truck roll over several feet into the eastern end of the bridge. She went to the home of Mrs. Alfred Wells where she picked up Edward Wells and took him to the accident scene.

The next witness, Edward Wells, South Kidare fisherman, told the jury that the deceased, Martin McIntyre, was at his home the afternoon of the accident. He left later for Alberton with his brother Robert driving his truck.

Some time later Eviola Cahill arrived and took him to the scene of an accident on Gillian's Bridge where he found the half-ton truck part way over the bridge railing. His brother, Robert, was lying near the truck and McIntyre was some distance away on the pavement.

BOUGHT LIQUOR
Robert Wells, a South Kidare fisherman, told of driving McIntyre into Alberton where he bought a pint of gin for McIntyre who had no permit. Witness said he took a small drink of the gin and that McIntyre had two or three drinks as they drove along.

They made several calls and were returning from Kidare towards South Kidare when his truck went out of control. He estimated driving about 55 when truck pulled for ditch and came back out suddenly and crossed the bridge. He couldn't remember anything further about the accident.

Dr. Stanley Hellmich said he went to the accident scene where he pronounced McIntyre dead. Wells was bleeding from the nose, ears and mouth and he asked that he be sent by ambulance directly to the Prince County Hospital in Summerside.

LEONARD HUNTER ALBERTON
Lecturer Hunter Alberton, said that Wells and McIntyre called in Alberton where he was working. Wells got out of the truck while he talked with McIntyre about his drinking. He could not say if they were drinking.

NO FLATS
Alberton garage operator Douglas Rix gave evidence that there were no flat tires on the truck following the accident, brakes and running gear were good.

Const. Ed. McCre, Alberton detachment of the RCMP, submitted measurements and photos made at the scene. Skid marks indicated the vehicle rolled over seven times. He found no injury or smell of liquor.
