

Dodgers Blast Redlegs As Giants Beat Cards

Don Newcombe made a belated return to form with a five-hit shutout for a 4-0 Brooklyn victory over Cincinnati Wednesday. It was the ninth straight defeat for the Redlegs while the Dodgers moved within one point of second-place St. Louis in the National League race as New York's Giants chilled Cardinal pennant hopes, 13-6.

Those were the only games scheduled in the NL and left both the Cards and Dodgers 6½ games behind first-place Milwaukee. Cincinnati placed 12½ games back for a fourth-place tie with Philadelphia.

In the American League, second-place Chicago White Sox walloped Washington 12-6. The first-place New York Yankees were at Kansas City and Boston was at Cleveland in night games.

Baltimore smacked Detroit 9-3 in the other AL game.

Newcombe struck out six, walked only one in squaring his record at 10-10 with his first victory and first complete game since defeating the Redlegs July 12.

Frank Robinson had three of the Redleg hits, gaining a third-place tie with Pittsburgh's Dick Groat in the bat race at 327, passing Milwaukee's Hank Aaron, who has a .326 mark.

UPPED AVERAGE

Stan Musial upped his leading average to .342 with a home run and single in two at bats for the Cardinals, who saw five pitchers slammed for 13 hits including homers by Hank Sauer and Willie Mays—who was 2-for-4 and took second in the bat race at 328.

Musial also added a sacrifice fly with his 29th home run, his fourth in five games, and took the RBI lead with 97 to Aaron's 96.

The White Sox batted around in a seven-run third and a four-run sixth to rap the Senators, who had home runs from Bob Usher, Roy Sievers and Art Schult. It was Sievers' 32nd, tying Yankee Mickey Mantle for the AL lead. Joe Durham and Al Pihlak each hit three-run homers for the Orioles while Ray Moore, now 9-2 lifetime against Detroit, gained a 9-9 record with a seven-hit, Billy Hoelt lost it for a 5-8 record as the bids tagged 15 hits.

CLEVELAND (AP)—Ted Williams went hitless again Wednesday night against Cleveland pitching, but teammate Jim Piersall homered for the second straight night to give Boston Red Sox a 3-1 victory.

Wagner Sorry Giants Moving

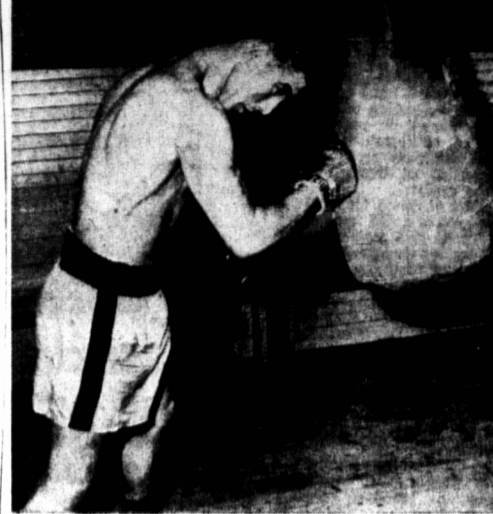
NEW YORK (AP)—Mayor Robert Wagner said Tuesday he was "very sorry" New York Giants are moving to San Francisco but added that he has not given up hope the Dodgers will remain in Brooklyn.

The mayor explained at a press conference the city and the Manhattan borough president's office had offered all facilities to help the Giants find a new playing site but Horace Stoneham, the club president, had not asked for assistance.

He said he was waiting for two financial reports prepared by engineers, one for the Brooklyn sports centre authority and one for a special mayor's committee to study the economic feasibility of locating a new stadium in downtown Brooklyn.

Nels Stewart Dies At 56

WASAGA BEACH, Ont. (CP)—Nels Stewart, a big colorful guy in an era of colorful hockey players and rated as one of the greatest centres of all time, died suddenly Wednesday while vacationing at this Georgian Bay resort area. He was 56.

Known as "Old Poison," he played 14 seasons in the National Hockey League with three teams, closing out his career after the 1939-40 campaign. At that time, he held the all-time NHL scoring record of 324 goals for regular season play.

During the 1938 season, while playing with the old New York Americans, Stewart became the

first NHL player to score 300 goals. Since that time, three other players have joined the select circle, Maurice Richard of Montreal Canadiens, Gordie Howe of Detroit Red Wings, and Ted Lindsay, recently traded from Detroit Red Wings to Chicago Black Hawks.

Born in Montreal in 1902, Stewart grew up in Toronto. He teamed with the late Babe Siebert, and Hooley Smith to form the Maroons' famed 5-line. Siebert was drowned several years ago.

Stewart climbed to the NHL and Montreal Maroons in the 1925-26 season. He became the first rookie to win the scoring championship and the same year was named the winner of the Hart Trophy, the league's award for its most valuable player.

Playing in the times of men like King Clancy and Red Horner and Charlie Conacher of Toronto Maple Leafs, Frank Boucher and the Cooks, Bill and Bun, of New York Rangers, Eddie Shore of Boston Bruins, Howie Morenz and Aurel Joliat of the Canadiens, Stewart was a star among stars—the guy the crowd loved to watch.

A big, deceptively slow-moving player, he was a terror at close range.

Stewart was selected to the Hockey Hall of Fame in 1952.
