COOK'S CORNER

LEMON SQUARES
1/2 cup white sugar
3/4 cup butter
3/4 cup flour
1 cup soda biscuits rolled (about 14)
Mix and spread in 9 inch pan.
Fill with:
1 egg beaten
1 cup white sugar
2 tbs. cornstarch
1 lemon, juice and rind
3/4 cup hot water.
Mix sugar, cornstarch and water. Cook until there is no taste of raw starch over low heat. Add beaten egg and lemon juice and rind. Cook a few minutes longer. Cool slightly. Spread filling over first mixture and bake 30 mins. in 250 deg. F. oven.
