PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND BANK NOTES.—It would almost seem as though the larger portion of the notes issued by the Prince Edward Island banks are finding their way to this section of the country. They abound as plentifully as our own currency. There is a discount of from one to two per cent. on them at the Banks, but in general trade, except among very particular people, they pass at their face. It is probable somebody is speculating in them; but we are not sufficiently versed in financial operations to understand in what manner.—Hx. Acadian Recorder.

OUR WASHINGTON LETTER.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug 7, 1877.

Since the recent enormous destruction of capital by the strikers and rioters, a question of vast importance is frequently asked—Where shall our workmen go? In many places—as in Pittsburg, there are hundreds of unemployed men to every chance of employment. It is a pity that many leave the country and crowd into the cities and manufacturing towns. No pursuit appears just now as safe, profitable and reliable as that of agriculture; therefore, it seems expedient that all influences should be used to make those who can by any means do so, betake themselves to rural districts and so aid practically in easing the burden of anxiety under which all patriots are groaning.

Would America be recognizable without the black race? Talk of emigration to Africa grows stronger and louder each month. No especial movement has been made in the district of Columbia (where about half the inhabitants are colored), but in South Carolina and other of the Southern States, the scheme is slowly but surely moving on. The white citizens have very generally discouraged the idea, on the grounds that the interests of the country require the labor of the colored race, and that in losing it we should lose a very valuable class of workmen. The blacks, superstitious from time immemorial, believe that, because the whites look upon the project with disfavor, they have some sinister design in view to the detriment of their race, and it is impossible to disabuse their minds of the impression. Therefore the efforts are redoubled to influence the movement favorably. The Charleston Courier says: "It seems that some prominent black men, who have hitherto not concerned themselves much in the matter, are now openly advocating the scheme as what they declare, a measure of relief for the race. It is hardly possible to go into a small shop, kept exclusively by black men, without hearing the sound of the molasses tree spoken of in terms of the wildest infatuation. Here and there a thoughtful black man is found, who has considered the exodus and opposes it, and in consequence has "a very hard road to travel with his people." Whatever it may all amount to, it is considered of sufficient importance for thinking men to give it some attention, and they express themselves on the subject as being of the opinion that if the movement is to be carried into effect, it ought to be placed under the direction and protection of the Government.

Unquestionably the United States might derive great advantage from an extensive colonization of Africa. The present consideration of the subject is most opportune, since the Republic of Liberia has recently signified a wish that our Government should assume a protectorate over that power. The Executive family are not yet roasted out. They keep pretty shady, to be sure, as they are well able to do in the leafy retreat they have chosen for their summer house; but they arrive in town on Sundays, regularly attending church. Last Sabbath the congregation was very small indeed at the Fountray Church, on account of the intense heat, but the President and Mrs. Hayes were in their accustomed places and appeared as cool and comfortable as need be.

Isaac Miller, of Liverpool, N. S., steward of the bark D. J. Brown, jumped overboard and was drowned to-day.
Caldwin Kester, a shipmate of John Riley, the Halifax sailor who was drowned, was arrested on suspicion of pushing him overboard.
The 70th regiment of Maryland has orders to move up the canal to Hancock, and will go to-day. U. S. troops co-operate with them at that place.
A large number of small buildings were burned at San Francisco last night. Loss, a quarter of a million; small insurance. Vigilance Committee assisted to keep order.
