

# Industrial Possibility Summerside Investigated

**SUMMERSIDE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN**  
For the purpose of attracting a major industry to the town, Health Minister Dr. Hubert McNeill yesterday announced that a full study into the possibility of establishing an industrial park in Summerside is currently being carried out.  
In this connection, Dr. McNeill said that the Green Road, located within the north-west boundary of the town will be reconstructed to meet the Pope Road at right angles.  
In addition, a further extension would be made so that Green Road would be connected to Duke Street, and possibly as far as Central Street.  
Facilities made available to the industry would include electricity, sewage, water, and all connecting roads would likely be paved, said Dr. McNeill. A railway siding may also be included.  
It has been proposed that the entire project be carried out under the Atlantic Development Loan Board, which is able to make full use of the finances of ARDA.  
The location where the survey is being carried out by the town is in the area of the Summerside for a number of years, Dr. McNeill said, with such an objective in mind.  
The site is unique as it has roads that have access to all areas of the town.  
The area has another advantage for the setting up of industry in that there are very few homes in the immediate vicinity. Therefore, there would most likely be little opposition to an industry locating in this area.

## West Prince's Economic Woes Set Out in Briefs

Eight briefs were presented in Alberton last evening at the second in a series of public hearings called by the division of research, department of industry and natural resources to inquire into the economic problems and future of western Prince County. The director of research, Hartwell Daley who conducted the meeting in the Alberton court house, was assisted in question by those presenting briefs by S. C. Wright, deputy minister of agriculture, Claude Smith, director of town planning and Genevieve Linkletter, director of County agricultural representative.

Organizations presenting briefs were Alberton and West Prince Board of Trade, presented by its president, J. Frank Bryan, Town of Alberton by Mayor M. Roy Leard; Alberton Industries by the secretary, Mrs. F. R. Leach; Laymen of Sacred Heart Parish Association by Ernest T. O'Sullivan, president; Regional High School by the principal, William C. O'Sullivan; Heart Parish CWL by the president, Mrs. C. J. O'Sullivan; Fisheries, education, tourist and harbours committees of Alberton and West Prince Board of Trade by Andrew Weir.

The economic decline of the area was blamed by the West Prince Board of Trade on the following basic factors: lack of capital investment; harbor and transportation neglect; pessimistic attitude of the population; reliance upon social welfare, reluctance to adapt to modern methods of agriculture and fishing and antiquated snow removal.

Remedial measures suggested included the reopening of new secondary roads in Western Prince via McNally's Point, connecting Lots 6 and 11 thereby providing a shorter power line to the area, the West Prince fish processing plants for fish, moss and vegetable processing, a national park, extension of existing parks, a golf course and government grader for lumber. The harbour committee of the board of trade listed neglect of Alberton harbor as an outstanding cause of economic decline. The harbor was described as closer to Corner Brook than the outports along the south and western Newfoundland shore than any other island port. About 100 tons of fish are landed in Alberton each year. The board suggested a fishery committee be set up to coordinate the improvement in ground fishing returns this year. Adequate facilities for processing fish were requested.

## Potato Harvest Expected To Speed Up Next Week

So far fewer requests than last year have been made for pickers although a larger harvest is anticipated. In 1962 some 700 pickers were brought in from Brunswick and Nova Scotia.

Asked what would be the reason for fewer requests for pickers, a department of agriculture spokesman said yesterday it was probably because of the more and better mechanical equipment available. If one farmer in an area has a large mechanical picker, other neighboring farmers generally rest or borrow their harvest, thus cutting down on the manpower need.
