This play, "Scattered Showers," will be presented by the Little Theatre players under the direction of Miss Hazel Hunter. After the play, the audience will be in discussion by Mrs. Duckworth who has had much practical experience in this field.

This same play was presented in Toronto before an audience of 900 people, who later were divided into discussion groups—a programme which proved to be most successful.

Discusses Wills At Rotary Luncheon

Mr. Allister MacLeod, the guest speaker at the weekly Rotary Luncheon held yesterday at the Charlottetown Hotel, told his fellow members and guests many things of interest regarding the trust business in its role in business and the professional world of today.

In speaking particularly of Wills, Mr. MacLeod said the earliest will extant dates back to 1805 B.C. In 1023 B.C. it was written of Ahophot that "When he saw his counsel was not followed, he put his household in order and hanged himself."

"An historian quotes this event to prove the Hebrew knowledge of Wills," Mr. MacLeod said. He dealt at length with the rights of the ecclesiastical or church courts, early acquired to determine the validity of wills of personal estates, although they generally followed the rules of Civil Law.

The rules as to wills in P. E. Island, with certain modifications are similar to the provisions of the English Wills Act of 1837. Mr. MacLeod described the requirements as to signatures of the testator and two or more witnesses. "Lawyers and trust officials strongly recommend that you do not prepare your own will," the speaker said, "but if you insist on doing it, be brief. Do not leave a gift to a witness, he will not receive it; do not attempt to change a will after it has been signed, by bold strokes of a pen through a certain clause, or by erasing it with a rubber."

Trust companies had their origin in the United States between 1820 and 1840, but they did not assume any status until 1890. The first Trust Company in Canada began business in 1862. There are now approximately 60 such companies in Canada.

The speaker, who had been introduced by the chairman, Dr. George Fisher, was thanked for his talk by President Bill Reid on behalf of the club.

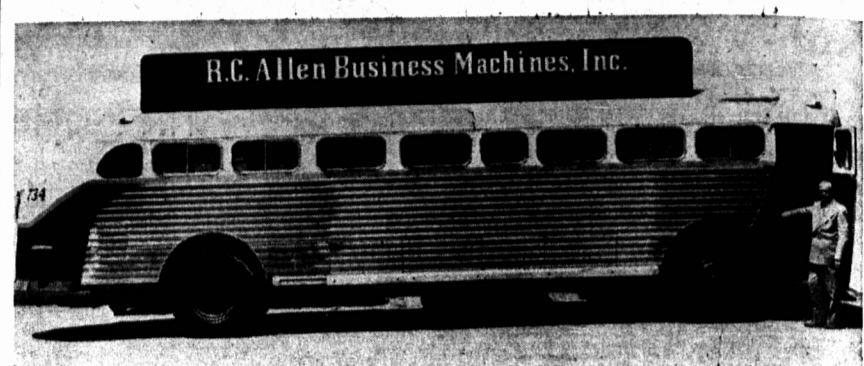
