INGRID BERGMAN AS 'JOAN OF ARC'

With Ingrid Bergman starring in the title-role, Victor Fleming's production, 'Joan of Arc,' the spectacular Sierra Pictures' offering in color by Technicolor, comes to the Prince Edward screen as a major dramatic achievement.

The drama displays in vivid pageantry the progress of the immortal 'Maid of Orleans' from the time she begins her campaign to reach the ear of the despised 'Dauphin,' through short-lived triumphs, and into her spectacular end at the stake in the marketplace at Rouen.

Walter Wanger produced the distinguished offering, which is based on the stage play, 'Joan of Lorraine,' by Maxwell Anderson. The screenplay was written by Anderson and Andrew Selt. Victor Fleming directed 'Joan of Arc,' which is distributed by RKO.

The impressive settings include the village of Domremy, the town of Vaucouleurs, 'The Dauphin's' court at Chinon, the Tourelle foris at Orleans, the great cathedral of Rheims, in addition to the castle and square at Rouen where the heroine is burned at the stake. Striking use of color accentuates the moods of the various sequences has been employed in making the picture.

Sierra Pictures is composed of Wanger, Fleming and Miss Bergman herself, making the latter not only the star, but one of the producers. She had desired to play the role ever since she played it in the Maxwell Anderson version, 'Joan of Lorraine,' on Broadway.
