

Government-Industry Talks On Tariff Cuts Hang Fire

OTTAWA (CP)—Long-ated consultations between the government and Canadian industry still are hanging fire while the two giants of the West strive to draw up ground rules for the most year's big tariff-cutting negotiations.

Officials here indicate the consultations may start early next year. But no final decision has been made.

As long ago as July 5, Trade Minister Sharp said the government would consult Canadian business interests before the momentous "Kennedy round" of trade talks under GATT—the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade.

At stake is the power held by President Kennedy to lower the United States tariff wall by 50 per cent—a linear cut affecting virtually all commodities—

in return for similar action by other nations, notably the six-nation European Economic Community.

Since May, the complex process has been in a state of limbo. The U.S. tariff-cut offer in practice has been before a special GATT committee.

LOOK FOR PICTURE
The Canadian government had hoped the committee's work would produce, by the end of last summer, a fairly clear picture of how wide and deep the tariff cuts might eventually be.

The idea is to set up some form of consultation machinery to get the views of Canadian producers who would inevitably be affected.

Mr. Sharp said in July there was no point in doing this still the future picture was clear. Officials say this picture is still uncertain.

The big question mark is the position to be taken by the "the six" of the EEC—France, West Germany, Italy, Belgium, The Netherlands and Luxembourg—and particularly by the French government of President de Gaulle.
