

Oyster Planting Seeks To Overcome Disease Problem

OTTAWA (C) — A \$200,000, three-year oyster-restoration program in selected areas of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick is an experiment to determine whether a disease which has destroyed the oysters in the last two years can be overcome, a fisheries department official said Friday.

Oysters will pass on their disease-resistant qualities to succeeding generations. "We just can't go dumping oysters all over the place until we know if the experiment is going to succeed," the official said.

Malagash and Wallace areas of Nova Scotia. If the experiment is a success, other areas, probably including Shediac, will be seeded later. About 10,000 barrels of the P.E.I. seed oysters will be planted in the New Brunswick and Nova Scotia beds over a three-year period.

Magistrate's Court At Summerside

In county magistrate's court, Summerside yesterday, the case of a Summerside party charged with possession of liquor not covered by an individual permit was dismissed due to lack of evidence by Magistrate R. S. Hinton, Q. C.

Mr. Harold Goodwin was attorney for the accused and Mr. Neil MacLeod acted for the Crown. A Summerside man charged under the Excise Act with possession of a still suitable for the manufacture of illicit spirits had his case further adjourned until January 25th.

The case of a party from Borden charged under the Temperance Act was adjourned until January 15th. An Indian, originally from Lennox Island, whose case had been adjourned for sentence since last January with the proviso that he stay away from Lennox Island, was fined \$20 and costs in absentia.

The accused was ordered to return to his job in the United States and to stay away from Lennox Island when he appeared in court one year ago on a charge of creating a disturbance on the reservation. He reportedly has remained in the United States since returning to his job.

A Summerside party was fined under the Highway Traffic Act for driving without due care and attention (speeding) while a Kensington party paid a \$5.00 fine for failing to have his vehicle registration transferred, plus a fine of \$3.00 and costs for insufficient equipment on his truck.

All P. C. Hospital Patients To Be Examined By X-Ray For TB

"We are procuring through the Department of Health, a miniature X-Ray unit to be installed in Prince County Hospital stated Hon. Dr. M. Bonnell. It is hoped that this will be financed by Federal Health grant. This unit will X-Ray chests on all admissions to that hospital, and if it proves satisfactory, it will be installed in other hospitals in Charlottetown. This unit, said the minister, will not only serve as a means of discovering T.B., but will be a great advantage to the practicing physician in the hospital to pick up unsuspected cases of pneumonia, cancer and other allied conditions.
