At the "Winter Port Meeting," held in Halifax, the other day, Mr. Chipman "showed how rapidly Boston had developed its trade within the past five years by the efforts of a few determined men. Now they boasted that they were not only drawing away our population but our trade, and that they would continue to do till they starved us into annexation. We say this going on, yet were content to lay on our backs and do nothing. He would not hesitate to say that if the people of Halifax would for a time love the interests of their home better than politics they could have just whatever they asked for."

Mr. Perry, M. P. P., on Debts due the Public.

DURING last session, Mr. Perry, M. P. P., is reported (see Parliamentary Reporter, page 239) to have expressed a wish "to know whether any effort had been made during the past year, by the Government, to collect the amounts due the Department, as had been promised last session? He believed they were afraid to put the law into force for fear of making themselves unpopular in the country. All the arrears should be collected. No one in his section of the country could say that he (Mr. P.) had advised him to withhold payment of the monies due the Land Office." The italics are ours. Comment is needless.

Powal Items.

A cabinet maker has commenced business here. We hope he may do well.

There is a great dry out for water. The wells are dry; and so low are the streams that the millers can only run their mills a few hours per day.

Powal Bay was almost frozen over on Friday night. Two schooners are at the wharf. They will not get out if this weather continues.

A barque was loaded here this fall, but nearly all the cargo had to be taken out of her before she could get out. The dredge is wintered for a short time.

Dominion News Items.

5,182 tons of coal shipped last week at Picton, brings the total shipment for the season up to 248,858 tons.

The City of St. John was out of water on the 23rd inst. This was due to the heavy frost, which caused the formation of ice at the dams.

It is believed that Picton will suffer severely this winter from scarcity of water. The public wells are very dirty, and several recent deaths are attributed to bad water. Already water has to be hauled from the mill dam and a lake over a mile distant from the town. This is not a pleasant outlook for the winter.

A two year old daughter of Lemuel McGregor, of Picton, was left in the kitchen on Saturday morning, in company with a four-year old brother, while the mother went across the street to do some shopping. Mrs. McGregor returned in five minutes, and found the child's clothes in flames. The girl was terribly burned about the head and face, and died that night.

The Quebec Chronicle, which was a red-hot Grit at the last general election, "congratulates the electors of the County of Quebec on the good sense and good judgment which they have shown in returning their member to Parliament without opposition." It declares that "in Mr. Caron's case it would have been most ridiculous to offer opposition."

The future of the North-West is already assured, and the certainty of the early completion of the Canada Pacific is stimulating the construction of branch lines. During the present session application will be made for three several charters. One of these is for authority to build a road from the Souris coal fields to the Rocky Mountains, being a westward extension of the Manitoba south western project; another for a line from Milk River north westerly to Peace River, while the third is for a line from Portage la Prairie to Prince Albert, at the forks of the Saskatchewan.

Mr. A. Davis, contractor, has returned to Ottawa from investigating the leak in his work at Lachine Canal. The result will be to suspend operations until July next, and to throw two hundred or three hundred men out of employment.

Stellarton Relief Committee.

THE members of the Stellarton Relief Committee met in the City Council Chamber on Wednesday evening, and received the subscription lists from the collectors. The amount subscribed is over \$885. Mr. Simpson stated that he had letters from the country offering to send 500 pounds of oatmeal, 500 pounds of flour, and 100 bushels of potatoes. The Mayor stated that he had received from Mr. J. Beverley Harris the proceeds of his Reading on Tuesday night, which amounted to \$29.25. It was decided to immediately forward the amount subscribed, and also the provisions.
