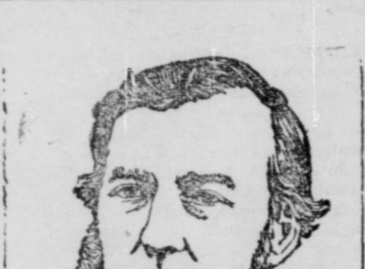

KILLED 350 IN A YEAR

ARESKI, THE TERROR OF THE KABYLES, GUILLOTINED IN ALGERIA.

All of His Band Betrayed, too—Women Seized Heads to Hurl as the Angel of Death Could Carry Them Away.

ARESKI is dead. This most famous of modern bandits, the terror of the Kabyles, the terror of the French Algerians, and even along the boulevards of Paris, as the "Terror of the Kabyles," and of whom the Arabs phrase was current, "The hand of Areski is sure, his blade is long and keen, and it always finds the hearts of his enemies," has met his death on the guillotine within a fortnight in the Algerian town of Azazga.

The execution was notable, inasmuch as all of the swarthy chief's savage henchmen were decapitated. Immediately before him, No. 1, a young man named Diebler, the famous headman of France, touched the button that let down the shining triangular blade upon the necks of the prisoners. The men surrounded the guillotine. The brilliant blue of their uniforms stood out vividly against the gleaming white walls of the guillotine. He measured steps toward the "widow," between two stout guards, halted in long black frock coat, some trousers and silk hose, at the platform upon which each victim was laid and which by a touch of mechanism slides slowly into the guillotine. "Monsieur," said the white-robed Arab-costumed, black-bearded, seven minutes from the second of the first fell and it was all over. Each bandit died in one and one-half seconds.

Not weakened. The only complaint he made, while the machine of death was put in its place and the white blades were carefully tried. An hour more and the necks of the condemned were seen to the guillotine. He might not be swayed, a custom as old as the guillotine. At 5, when no other gift appeared in the sky save a faint, yellowish glow, the sentence was read and the white-robed Arab-costumed, black-bearded, seven minutes from the second of the first fell and it was all over. Each bandit died in one and one-half seconds.

London's PEOPLE.

Statistics as to the Population of the World's Greatest City.

The London county council has just issued a big volume full of interesting statistics. It appears that of the real estate population only 65 per cent were born in London, and of born Londoners living in England 77 per cent still live in London and 23 per cent in the rest of the country.

The proportion of London Scotch has remained stationary. The Irish have decreased considerably, and the foreigners, chiefly Poles and Russians, have increased. The actual total population of registration London at the last census was 4,211,742. This total falls short of the 4,211,742 calculated on the basis of the known decadal increase, and it is estimated that 328,524 persons have been born in London since the last census, 277 per cent of total number of deaths, 86,823, of which 49 per cent represents the birth mortality during 5 years of age.

The sex ratio shows that more than 44 per cent of the population are either under 20 years of age or over 70, and may be presumed not to be mainly supported by their own labor; the remainder, mostly between the ages of 20 and 70, may be reckoned as workers of one sort or another, without regard to the unemployed. Of these workers of both sexes in round numbers, 19,000,000 are in professional, commercial, and industrial, the total occupied class numbering nearly 2,600,000 of the "industrial" million holders and carpenters account for 15,000,000 mechanics and laborers for 11,000,000, and "dress" for more than 200,000 about 70 per cent of whom are women.

The rest of this particular million are distributed among minor trades and industries.

FACTS OF ALL SORTS.

A whale, when struck by a harpoon, cannot swim faster than nine miles in an hour.

Some of the condors shot in the Andes Mountains have a spread of wing from 15 to 20 feet.

Signor Bonomi, one of the Panama Canal engineers, who was in New Orleans recently, said the work would begin on the canal on a large scale about July 1.

The London Economist says that any reduction of wages in England in 1894 was more than offset by the fall of prices, and that on the whole it was a year of prosperity for the poor.

A telephone wire is carried a mile and a half without support over Lake Wallen, between Quinzen and Murie, in the Canton of St. Gallen, Switzerland. The wire is two millimetres in diameter.

Milwaukee tried the experiment of turning over the vacant land in the city limits for potato patches to be cultivated for the benefit of the poor. Seventy-five acres of land was tendered for this purpose, but only six men appeared to till it.

The natives of Sumatra have a visiting card consisting of a piece of wood about a foot long, decorated with a bunch of straw and knife.

The mole is not so blind as many persons suppose, according to an English authority. Its eye is hardly larger than a pin head, and is carefully protected from mist and dirt by means of enclosing hairs.

In Mexico two substitute jurymen act with the regular jury, so that sudden illness will not effect the verdict.

The skeleton of an average whale is said to weigh no less than 50,000 pounds.

The production of aluminum has increased from 150 pounds in 1887 to 5,625 pounds last year. During this time the price has dropped from 19 a pound to about 70 cents.

The albatross has been known to follow a ship for two months without even being seen to alight in the water to take a moment's rest. It is believed to sleep on the wing.

The bottom of the Atlantic forms a sort of terrace along the continent, sloping gradually for several miles, then suddenly descending to a far greater depth. In general, about one hundred miles from the shore there is a depth of one hundred fathoms, but in ten miles the depth exceeds one thousand fathoms.

Brazil has 3,200,000 square miles, or about the area of the United States, excluding Alaska.

Military education is commenced at an earlier age in Turkey than in any other civilized country. Before the aspirant for military honors is 12 years old he has received a preliminary course of instruction.

It is proposed to build a railroad from Port Said, at the mouth of the Suez Canal, across Northern Arabia, through the Gulf of Aden, to Bombay, India, a distance of 2,400 miles, at a cost of \$75,000,000.

The Eskimo woman's ambition for jewelry extends no further than a ring or two, and a brass or copper one is valued as highly by them as a gold one would be.

It is said that the rays of the arc light have a decided narcotic value, and that the arc unprotected by a glass globe is a very useful disinfectant agent. It is asserted that bad odors are dissipated by the direct rays.

A novelty in bicycles is shown in the window of a New York dealer. Its entire frame, including the handles, and every part, is made of rubber, spokes and tires, is of iron, cast in imitation of the branches of trees with the bark left on.

Out a common radish in two, hollow the interior slightly, then rub it gently upon a dinner plate. In a moment you can lift the radish by the tail and the plate will be held to it as if by a magnet. It is for the plates will adhere as tightly as if the two objects were pasted together.

Quite a profitable business is done in some large towns in England by lending to restaurants for exhibition purposes.

The coast of Japan is well protected with light houses, light house lightships, beacons, buoys. Its channels are well charted and well sounded.

Turin has just opened a great public bath, where for 2 cents a hot or cold bath may be had in a separate room with service and attendants.

Check pads for improving the contour of the face cost \$50 a pair in London. They are made of corallite, and have to be moulded with the face.

Since the Brooklyn Bridge was opened it has been crossed 20,000,000 times a year.

Berlin is one of the most cosmopolitan of European cities. Though it is the capital of Germany, only 37 per cent of its inhabitants are Germans by birth.

The longest unbroken six ft. of telegraphic cable in the world is the one which connects the Red Sea with India, 3,300 knots being the total length of cable used.

A rumour under the Clyde at Glasgow has just been finished, and will be opened to traffic shortly. It is 13 feet in diameter and 700 feet long. It has been five years building, and cost \$1,000,000.

One of the curiosities of the Travemuer (Germany) cemetery is a tomb stone made in the shape of a granite lead pencil. It is of "half round" or red Italian granite, fitted with a cap of granite over eight inches in diameter.

Kindling locomotive fires with oil is a complete success, and the cost one-third that of using wood.

The share of land falling to each inhabitant of the globe in the event of partition might be set down at twenty-three and a half acres.

A carp taken out of the water may be kept alive for over twelve hours by a piece of bread soaked in watery placed in its mouth.

An experimenter once drew out of the body of a spider 3,480 yards of the thread—a length but little short of two miles.

A fabric woven of spider's thread is more glossy than that from the silk-worm's product, and is of a beautiful golden color.

In America there are 132 paper mills, employing 50,757 employees and using an aggregate of 695,877 horse power for driving them.

The pit from corals is now thought to give promise of a satisfactory material for use in warships to allow shot to pass through it, and then close to exclude water.
