MADAME CAUCHON, wife of the new Governor of the North-West, died at Winnipeg on the 6th.

WILLIAM ANGUS, of Montreal, has failed. Liabilities—direct, \$150,000; indirect, \$1,000,000.

The great tobacco factory at Venice was recently destroyed by fire. The loss is over \$100,000.

It is reported here that Hon. D. MacDonald has resigned his seat in the Local Legislature of Nova Scotia.

LORD DUFFERIN will not leave Canada till next autumn. The Duke of Manchester is spoken of as his successor.

The St. John's Newfoundlanders repeats its statement that the prospect there for the coming winter is a dull one, owing to the comparative failure of the fisheries this season.

ANOTHER cargo of lobsters per the brig, C. C. Vanhorn, cleared from Halifax for London on Tuesday, valued at \$63,427. Potatoes and other things brought the total value up to \$71,523.

BRITISH COLUMBIA is excited over gold quartz discoveries in Carbon District. The ledge has been traced five miles, with a width of 13 to 55 inches, assays from 50 feet below the surface, and gives \$40 to \$90 a ton. An official report from the Government Engineer is expected next week.

A FRENCH Canadian paper, said to be the mouthpiece of Senator Hector Fabre, is of opinion that "a general convention of Liberals, say at Montreal or Ottawa, would be of vast benefit to the party just now. Our ranks need solidifying; we want a little more homogeneity before entering on the general engagement next year."

DIPHTHERIA.—The Moncton Times reports that diphtheria is making sad havoc among the French of Kent Co., N. B. Upwards of sixty cases have resulted fatally in the parishes of Richibucto and Wellington. Eight children (all French) were buried at the Roman Catholic Chapel grounds in ten days, and one family lost three children between the hours of eight and twelve on Sunday night last.

FIRE.—On the morning of the 6th, the house owned by Graham and Newlands, builders, and occupied by Lenard Ferrar, as a baker, on Brunswick street, Halifax, was destroyed on fire. The latter lost his stock valued from \$300 to \$400, on which there was no insurance. A stable in the rear was also burned with a house. The buildings were insured.

FALL OF A LARGE BUILDING.—In St. John, on Thursday last, the double four-story brick building, almost finished, belonging to the estate of the late J. M. Walker, situated on Prince William Street, fell, tearing away a portion of the building adjoining, owned by Messrs. McMillan. Loss fully fifteen thousand, it is thought. J. & W. C. Spears, of New York, the contractors, will be the losers. One boy was hurt. Eight men who were working on the Walker building, successfully escaped.

ENTHUSIASTIC RECEPTION.—The Rev. G. M. Grant, the Principal elect of Queen's College, arrived on Friday afternoon. He was accorded a most enthusiastic greeting at the station by the Professors and students of Arts and Medical Colleges. The students marched to the depot, headed by the "A" Battery band. The formal reception is deferred until next week. The Principal was accompanied to the residence of Professor Mackerras, whose guest he will remain for a few days.—Kingston Despatch.

JUDGE PETERS' BUILDING.—The St. John News reports that Hon. Thos. R. Jones has given the Inspector of Buildings notice that he will hold him and the Corporation responsible, as well as Judge Peters, in case his building, on Canterbury street, is damaged by the Judge's building, on Germain street. He states that the back of the latter building has settled to an alarming degree, and as the building is five stories high he fears that it will fall in upon his building, causing loss of life as well as damage to his property. Large numbers of persons, including many sewing girls, are employed in Mr. Jones' building.

WAR NEWS.

Another Turkish Victory Reported.

[By Telegraph to Reading Room and Daily Examiner.]

LONDON, Dec. 8.

It is reported that Turkey will treat separately with Russia, should Erzeroume be taken and the road to Adrianople threatened.

It is thought that the Porte will cede a free passage of the Bosphorus rather than permit an advance on Constantinople. A part of the Russian Baltic fleet have sailed for the Mediterranean.

It is reported, and believed to be correct, that Suleiman Pasha has gained another victory between Elena and Tirnova.

The Grand Vizier has resigned; but the Sultan has refused to accept his resignation.

Russian outrages are reported from Kasentek. Mueklar Pasha's army now numbers 25,000, and reinforcements are being sent to him.

The Czar's melancholy is increasing, and he will immediately return to St. Petersburg, unless the reserves at Elena and Topkai lead to future success.

The Portuguese Minister at the Vatican has been elevated to the rank of an Ambassador, and Portugal claims the right to vote in the next Papal election.

Indignation Meeting at Brookfield.

ACCORDING to announcement, an indignation meeting was held at Brookfield Hall on the evening of Thursday last. We learn that a very strong resolution condemnatory of the Government was passed. Brookfield used to be a stronghold of Mr. L. H. Davies and his followers. Their Acts, of one short year have, however, pretty thoroughly opened the eyes of the people to the fact that they are "NOT THE MEN" to administer our public affairs.

MARRIAGE AND ITS EFFECT ON LONGEVITY.

A job to coax bachelors out of single blessedness, and to decrease the stock of old maids by an increased demand for wives may be involved in some statements made by the "London Review" in regard to the relations existing between marriage and longevity. Old maids and bachelors, it says, rarely attain to extreme old age, and then it tells of people living to extraordinary ages by wedding a dozen times or so, while Jacob Jay of Bordeaux died in 1772, at the age of 100 years, having laid seventeen wives in the grave, and Margaret McDowall, a Scotch-woman, died in 1765 at the age of 105, having wept at the untimely demise of thirteen men whose names she had borne in rotation. Thus far the "Review" does not put a very extraordinary tax upon one's capacity for bolting a tough morsel, but the strain is rather severe when it goes on to speak of a pair named Rovin, who died in Hungary in 1741, the man aged 170 and the woman 164, leaving a tender youth 116 years old to bewail his orphanage, and reflect on the strength of that tie which held his parents together for 148 years.
