There is an almanac for 1884 which will save lawyers and sheriffs a great deal of trouble; and there are rates of the telegraph, rates of the railway, etc., which may easily be referred to by all who have the Almanac. WE regret to hear that there is on foot a report that the Band of the 82nd Battalion is to be disbanded. It seems that though they meet for practice two or three nights out of every week, they are not allowed "pay" as the ordinary Militia men who are required to attend drill only ten times a year. We are greatly indebted to the Band, and especially to its skilful leader, who for twenty years has been to the front whenever its services were required; and we hope the cause of complaint will be removed.

WE were to-day shown a very handsome medal, that has been presented to No. 1 Battery of P. E. Island Provincial Brigade of Garrison Artillery, by the Hon. Judge Young, of this city. The medal, which is suspended from a ribbon having three gold clasps, consists of a military star, surmounted by an Imperial crown, having a centre piece of gold, on which an artilleryman is shown in bas relief in the act of taking aim. On the back is the following inscription:—"Presented to No. 1 Battery, P. E. Island Pro. Bri. of Gar. Art., by the Hon. Mr. Justice Young, Honorary member of the Battery." The conditions under which it is to be competed for are that the member of the Battery making the highest aggregate number of points in four half yearly competitions, shall become the winner, and that in the maximum number of points at each half yearly competition. Gunner Fredrick McKenzie, who, though a recruit, succeeded in beating the veterans of the Battery at the first match in the competition, is its present holder.

DR. WIGGINS PREDICTS ANOTHER STORM.—For the convenience of those who do not wish to wait till March for his mammoth storm, Dr. F. Stone Wiggins has now predicted a big storm on 24 February. He writes to Mr. Haswell, of New York:—"The coming winter will be remarkable for heavy and well-defined storms. If I were the owner of a ship I would not allow one of them to be on the Atlantic Ocean on the 8th of February, or on the 9th, 10th and 11th of March, though the former storm will be inferior to the latter. You may begin marine work with safety after the middle of April next. Take my advice and save your thousands."

The Brain Food of Yale Boys.

One New Haven firm sells 120,000 cigarettes a month to Yale College students, or for the ten months of the year, when the "men" are in town, 1,200,000, at a cost of a little more than half a cent apiece, a total of about \$3,600 a year. The same firm receives \$16,000 yearly for soda and mineral waters sold to the students, and the monthly cigar account with the collegians reaches \$500. And this is the record of but one firm.—Hartford Courant.

The wife of fasting Dr. Tanner has taken up her abode in France, having obtained a divorce from her eccentric husband under the following circumstances: Dr. Tanner, it appears, is peculiarly addicted to extraordinary fancies, and some time since he thought that he had found out that the human character became modified according to the food taken by the individual, and especially in relation to the vegetables consumed.
