The York farmer took the senior male championship and grand championship as well as the senior female championship and grand championship. He also took the junior female championship and ended his victory by winning the Exhibition Association trophy for having the junior champion Angus.

### Bickering Marks House Printing Bureau Debate

OTTAWA (CP)—Bickering and wrangling marked Thursday's chapter of Parliament's printing bureau inquiry with Liberals labelling Toronto Conservative David Walker as a “prosecuting attorney” and the Rose-dale lawyer countering that the Liberals were slowly “hanging” themselves.

consider disclosure of these documents just “good, clean fun” because they dealt with the former Liberal government. But, while he had “nothing to hide” and wanted all aspects of construction inquiry to be investigated, a minister had every right to receive confidential reports of his officials and expect those reports to remain secret.

A spate of clashes emerged as Liberal J.W. Pickersgill charged the Commons public accounts committee with embarking on a “dangerous precedent” in making public confidential reports of senior civil servants in connection with printing bureau construction.

WINCH URGES CARE
