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Vanguard Of Potato Pickers From Mainland

The vanguard of the potato pickers from the mainland will arrive in Summerside tonight for distribution among the potato growers of Prince County. Approximately 100 are expected. The majority will be from Cape Breton Island and four bus loads from that point of origin are expected to arrive about eight o'clock at the office of the Unemployment Insurance Commission.

Farmers will be on hand to receive whatever number of men they have ordered. A few will also come by train from the Moncton and New Glasgow areas. The demand for help in the potato fields is not expected to be as great as last year when 500 men were brought in for Prince County alone.

Due to decreased acreage and a smaller crop the number of out-of-the-province help needed is not expected to exceed 300 this year.—S.

Princess To Carry Out Visit To U.S.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 29 (AP)—Princess Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh will arrive in Washington Oct. 21 for a three-day state visit after a tour of Canada.

They will be the guests of President and Mrs. Truman at Blair House, the temporary residence of the President.

The White House said today the Princess and the Duke will fly to Washington from Montreal aboard an R.C.A.F. plane and will be met by Mr. and Mrs. Truman.

The Princess and the Duke were originally due to visit Washington from Oct. 24 to 26, but there was a delay pending improvement in the condition of the King, recovering from an operation.

The royal visitors will hardly be off their plane before attending a reception given in their honor by Washington press and radio correspondents.

That night the Trumans will give a dinner in their honor at Blair House.

The Royal Highnesses will visit the home of George Washington at Mount Vernon and the Arlington National Cemetery Nov. 1.

At noon they will meet the ambassadors of the Commonwealth countries and senior officers of their diplomatic missions in Washington at the Canadian Embassy. Later that day they will attend a reception by the British Ambassador and Lady Oliver Franks for "persons connected with official and public life of the capital."

In the evening, the royal couple will entertain Mr. and Mrs. Truman at an official dinner in the Canadian Embassy.

They will do some sightseeing the following morning, Friday, Nov. 2, and leave by air for Montreal in the early afternoon.
