

confidence of the public—as long as a public sentence is preferable, in the way of example, to a private adjudication—

As long as uniformity in the scale of punishment and manner of proceeding is better than uncertainty—as long as responsibility is more confidently incurred when shared amongst more parties than one—as long, I say, as English feelings prevail—so long, except always in cases requiring the immediate commitment of felons and others—

will an open Court of Magistrates be a desirable thing.—If such a Court existed, the whole machinery of the Court for the recovery of small debts, and that to try assaults and batteries, would be merged into it, by means in the former case, of stated periods being named to hold Special Sessions, for the purpose of adjudicating on them.

Many of the English Statutes require the presence of two Magistrates, particularly when the adjudication is between parties, and the Crown not the prosecuting party. The system of levying fines, by means of distress, does not work near so well as the commitment of parties till fines are paid; but this is a fault in practice as common in the English as the Island Statutes.

I am afraid, Sir, I have in contemplation more reforms than are at present likely to be effected, or meet with public concurrence; but the improvements proposed in the Legislature will, I hope, meet with favour; and I trust, whilst all the world is endeavouring to imitate the judicial, no less than the political institutions of our parent country, that we, her children, will not refuse to conform to them as opportunities for doing so shall arise.

Sir—When our late Representative, the Hon. Charles Young, published his address to us on his being called to the Legislative Council, and renewed the different pledges he had formerly made, viz. "to advocate our cause and that of the people—to do all in his power to reform grievances wherever they may exist, to have the Tenantry relieved from that weight of oppression which has almost borne them to the dust, &c., and again with such praiseworthy zeal avowed himself to be a "Reformer," he enjoined us to "watch him narrowly in his new career, and if he swerved from these principles—and deserted our cause—that then "he permitted every tongue in the Island to wag at him in derision, and his name to be an execration to those who "pronounce it."

Having read Mr. Young's address, it was the opinion of some of my neighbours, as well as myself, that in his new station we could not watch his career so well as when he was in the House of Assembly; but, Sir, I am happy to observe that you have given us, in your last week's paper, a report of the speeches in the Legislative Council on a very important question—that of raising the Salary of the Lieut. Governor of this Colony out of the funds of the people; and by which report it appears, that Mr. Young was an advocate for the measure, and voted for an addition to his Excellency's Salary. I offer no remark on Mr. Young's conduct therein; but I will take that liberty which Mr. Young leaves us to make use of, and will ask him through your paper, Whether he would have voted the same way on the same question in the House of Assembly, had he remained there? And if he says, that he would have done so, then, I ask, Whether he at any time, before the Legislature met, had expressed himself to the effect, that he would not do so in the House of Assembly? I am sure Mr. Young will at once favour us with a clear answer to these plain questions.
