Sandy Watson Chastises CAHA

Watson Sparkplug Of 1948 Olympic And World Champs

OTTAWA (CP)—Sandy Watson, sparkplug of Canada's 1948 Olympic and world hockey champions Thursday bodychecked the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association for its decision not to send a team to the 1957 championships in Moscow.

"They have no gumption to put anything across, said Dr. A. G. (Sandy) Watson who helped assemble an RCAF team for the 1948 Olympics after the CAHA found itself without a squad to send to St. Moritz, Switzerland. "They don't want to be bothered."

"I hope they won't get away with it," he said in an interview.

The CAHA announced Wednesday the executive has decided not to send a team to Moscow because of the great change that has taken place in world affairs in recent weeks.

Watson described the CAHA's reason as "a gag" to get out of sending a team to the world championships.

He said difficulty in raising \$40,000 to send a team to the championships, at a time when the public might feel the money might better be sent for Hungarian relief, left the CAHA executive with no alternative.

TIME FOR CHANGE

Watson said he believes the CAHA and its leaders "have served the purpose." It was time new men took over.

He said it would be "judicious" to send a team to Moscow if the situation in January was the same as now. But he said he believes it is too early to decide now, on the basis of international conditions, whether to send a team or not.

As long as there was a chance the situation might improve there was no need to take the decision the CAHA did.

"It will look as though we're afraid of the Russians," Watson said. "I am sure junior Canadians out the Vernon club, with some additional strength, would beat the Russians on their own ice."

"I would stake my whole reputation on that."

While he wasn't scoring goals Pineau helped linemates Gordon Currie and Harold (Red) Howatt on first period efforts and set up coach Ready for the final tally of the night in the third.

Hard working Dick Carroll scored Montague's lone goal in the second period after the youth club had built up a 5-0 lead.

WIDE OPEN

The game was wide open from the starting whistle and some 700 fans were treated to a fast and furious if not close hockey game. The B.Y.C. broke the game open after a little more than 4 minutes when they fired three goals in exactly 38 seconds. But they couldn't beat an overworked Bobby by Dillon in the second period again during the period even though they fired 18 shots at him.

Play was much more even in the second period but B.Y.C. still outscored Montague 2-1. Montague missed a great chance when they were awarded a penalty shot when Red MacFadden was tripped by Frank Smith when he was in the clear. Cross Country Race Slated For St. Dunstan's Saturday

Something new in the line of sport will be added to St. Dunstan's University Saturday when a Maritime Invitational Cross Country racing meet will be staged.

The Saints will be putting their five-man team against squads from Minto Memorial High School of New Brunswick, and a possible entry from P.W.C. P.W.C. are also new hands at this sport but Minto has been campaigning for some years and are presently holders of the New Brunswick championship and in 1955 they won the Canadian championship at Hamilton, Ontario.

The distance covered during the race will be about three miles.

If the meet is successful it is hoped that a Maritime championship will be held in Charlottetown.

Cross country differs from distance running in that the race is not always in the swiftest. What is meant by that is that it is a team race and the team represented by the winning runner is not necessarily the winner. The winner is declared on a points basis. One point is allotted for the runner who finishes first, two points for second, etc. The team which has the lowest aggregate is the winner.

The Saints team is coached by Bill Phillips of Saint John, a former distance runner, with Martin Clooney as assistant coach. The team is composed of Frank Gillis (P.E.I.), Dick Ays (New York), Ray Bryant (Maine), Ed LeClair (P.E.I.) and Rolfe Sullivan (P.E.I.).

O'Quinn May Be Lost To Al's For Ti-Cat Game

MONTREAL (CP) — Red O'Quinn was more talked about in Montreal Thursday than Khrushchev or Nasser. To a lesser degree and made the front pages. Boston Humbles Black Hawks 5-3

CHICAGO (AP) — Don McKenney fired two goals to pace the National Hockey League leading Boston Bruins to a 5-3 victory over the Chicago Black Hawks in Chicago Stadium Thursday night.

It was Boston's seventh straight triumph.

The victory kept the Bruins one point ahead of Detroit, which beat Toronto, 4-2, Thursday night.
