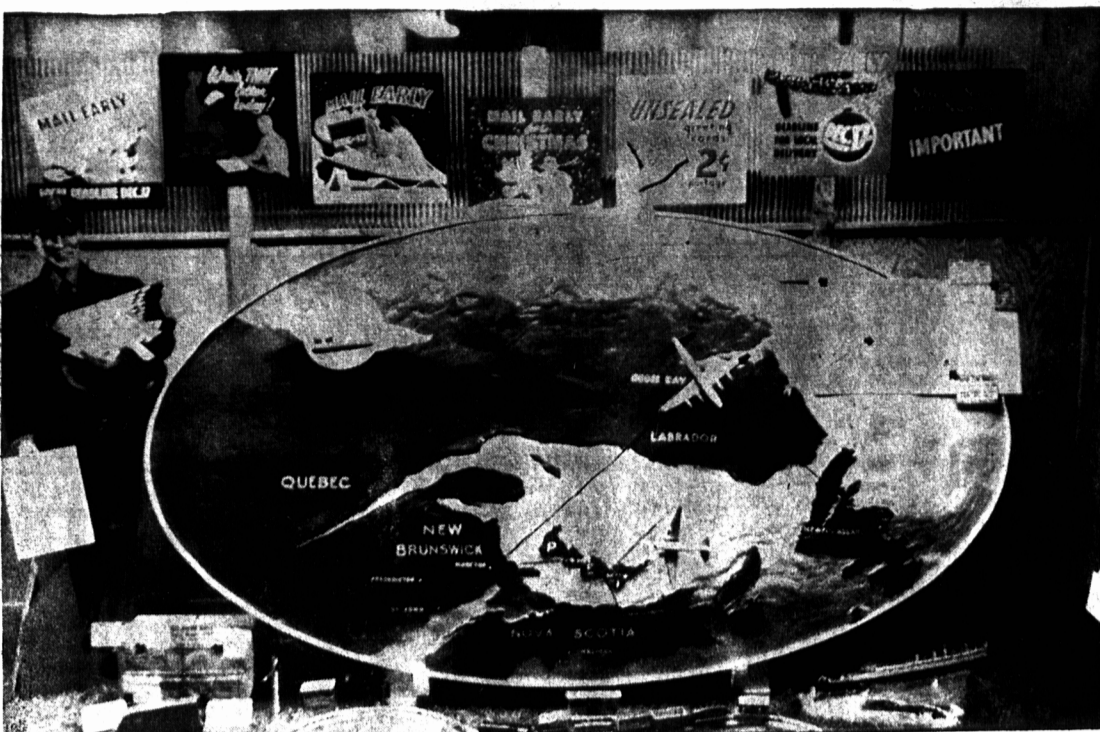

Coldest December Experienced In 1919

The coldest December recorded in Prince Edward Island for the past 46 years was in 1919 when the lowest temperature dropped to 14 below zero and for seven consecutive days the thermometer showed an average of 6.4 below. The mean temperature for the month was 19.1, according to Warren Burns of the Experimental Farm. It is interesting to note that although no such severe temperatures for the present month have been experienced, the average for the first seven days has been considerably lower than it was in 1919. December, 1922 was also quite severe. The average for the month, that year, was 19.2 and the lowest reading was 11 below. In 1934 another cold December is recalled when the average was 19.1. These figures may have little or no significance in so far as the kind of weather island residents are in for but it can be assumed that few will be using that well worn saying, "Oh for the good old days."

1,648 Donors Registered During 4 Days Of Clinics

Five hundred and five donors reported at yesterday's Red Cross blood donor clinic held in the "Clover Club" which was placed at the disposal of the Red Cross for the two days by the Charlottetown Branch of the Canadian Legion. Charlottetown's total for the two days clinics was 910 in an objective of 1,000 which is indeed a very creditable showing although considerably below the 1,065 mark reached in Charlottetown at the June clinics. A quick glance at the lists of donors who reported revealed that the great majority of them were residents of Charlottetown, the Royalties, Spring Park and Parkdale and that there was a higher percentage of new donors than ever before. The outstanding response from the students of St. Dunstan's University. The thorough canvass was conducted by the president of the Student's Council, Mr. Dick Wedge, assisted by Mr. George Mullally, resulted in over 150 students and faculty members attending the clinic. Free transportation of the students and motor from the clinic by the Island Motor Transport simplified this problem. Assistants at yesterday's clinics were members of the "Willing Circle" of the King's Daughters of Trinity Church who staffed and provided refreshments for the morning and afternoon sessions, and the Junior Women's Association of Trinity Church who looked after the evening hours. Other tasks in connection with the clinics were undertaken by representatives of the Women's Auxiliary, Charlottetown Branch of the Canadian Legion, local nurses, members of the Red Cross Corps, Parkdale Women's Institute and High School Red Cross members from Notre Dame Academy. The four days of clinics will repay the Province's debt of 500, and leave a balance of 1,148 which will provide a credit for approximately the next four and a half months only.

The group held a typical meeting with Mrs. MacCallum presenting the mission study period, after which the children put on a Christmas programme of carol singing, duets, solos and recitations. A platform Nativity Scene, brought the real meaning of Christmas to all. Before closing a happy time was spent as the grown-ups and about fifty children sat around gaily decorated tables and partook of bountiful refreshments.

Ontario Farm Group To Tour Eastern Canada

TORONTO (CP)—The Ontario Soil and Crop Improvement Association will sponsor a 15-day goodwill tour of eastern Canada next summer, the department of agriculture said Thursday. The railway and bus tour is scheduled to start at Toronto July 5. It will include visits to New Brunswick, Maine, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island and Quebec. The first stop will be at the St. Lawrence seaway project near Cornwall, Ont., then a visit to the 1,800-acre potato farm of Sen. Fred Perry at Grand Falls, N.B., the Fredericton experimental station and Camp Gagetown, the big New Brunswick army station. On Cape Breton island, the tour will include the old French town and fort at Louisbourg, the Sydney steel mill, a coal mine and fishing centres.
