THE NEWS IN SHORT METERS.

The Liberal Contractors' Club, Montreal, has decided to tender a banquet to Sir Wilfrid Laurier. The date chosen is April 11. Laurier has accepted.

Colorado expects to receive not less than \$6,000,000 from the state's big fruit crop this year, the greatest which the centennial state has ever known.

Mr. Fred G. Boyer, of Georgetown, is to attend the annual meeting of the Dominion Shorthorn Breeder's Association to be held in Toronto the first of February.

A firm of Roseland butchers has just cleared \$40,000 on a lot of cattle purchased in Alberta and sent to Dawson City. The meat sold at one dollar per pound.

It is interesting to note that the capital value of the British navy at the present time exceeds \$470,000,000. The first cost of the fleet which led to the downfall of Napoleon was but \$50,000,000.

The Templar, of Hamilton, announces a change in its control, by which it ceases to be the special organ of the Templars of Temperance and will henceforth be the property of an independent temperance publishing company. Briefly stated, "the aim of the change is to unite the efforts and interests of all the prohibition workers of Canada in the establishment of a strong national publishing house that will promote economy, efficiency and influence in the prosecution of the great reform." As the time approaches for the assembling of parliament the interest in the prohibition question grows very keen, especially in the Upper Provinces. In all probability there will be legislation the present winter in order to provide for the taking of a popular vote on the subject.

TRADE AND TRADE PROSPECTS.

NEW YORK, Jan. 9.—D. G. Dunn's weekly review of trade, issued on Saturday, says: "In figures, 1897 was not only the best year ever since 1892, but on the whole, the best ever definitely known. With 13,522 failures in number 11.5 per cent, less than 1896, and \$182,581,171 defaulted liabilities, 34 per cent, less than in 1896, the year's banking failures counted for \$28,249,700, and the commercial failures were but 13,351, with liabilities of \$164,332,071, the averages per failure being only \$13,559, the lowest ever known except in 1892. But even in that year the failures during the last half averaged, liabilities, \$10,477 per failure, while in the last half of 1897 the average was only \$9,593. The returns by branches of business show that in fifteen out of twenty-eight classes the failures were lower than in any previous year of which there is a record, with especially a large decrease in the great number of unclassified manufacturing and trading failures. Moreover, the year showed a remarkable decrease as some other prosperous years have shown an increase, in comparing the second with the first half.

GOLD NUGGETS.

The rush to the Klondike is now on and the prospectors are coming in so fast that the British Columbia resources are taxed to accommodate them. Three steamers are obliged to refuse accommodation to a large number of Australian and Canadian prospectors, and they have been obliged to wait over. The shipping people say however that in less than a month there will be enough steamers for all. Thirty mounted Police left today by the steamer Lee. The discovered of another Eldorado has been reported by a man named McLeod, this side of the Yukon, 600 miles inland from the Canadian Pacific coast. He has signed papers with a syndicate to lead their representatives to the place, and if things turn out right McLeod will receive 25 per cent of the profits.

It is stated by recent visitors to Labrador that they have reason to believe it contains deposits of gold of great richness and is destined to become a great mining country. There is evidence that gold exists in quantities that are equalled only by the deposits of the Klondike, in fact, is asserted that the deposits in Labrador are on the same range, as those on the Klondike. Those in the secret are arranging an expedition to the country. They propose to spend two or three months prospecting and then to take up a large number of claims in the most promising sections before the rush which they say will inevitably take place sooner or later. Preliminary arrangements for this expedition, which is to start in the spring, have already been made.
